FROM THE PASTORS DESK

The scriptures are the inspired word of God and many people believe they can have eternal life only through them. It is very important to search the scriptures but not to obtain eternal life. Jesus told some Jews, "Search the scriptures; for in them ye think ye have eternal life: and they are they which testify of me." (John 5:39). Eternal life is a gift of God and is not to be gained through the scriptures. Even if that life could be gained by such activity, the dead in sin would not take that approach because they have no desire for spiritual things. Jesus especially told these particular Jews, "And ye will not come to me, that ye might have life." (John 5:40). He also told these Jews that He knew them and they had not the love of God in them. (John 5:42). Therefore they would not and could not come to Him for life.

Even though eternal life is not obtained in, through, or by the scriptures, it is still important to search the scriptures. Jesus tells us they testify of Him and we are to search that testimony. If we are to know what the truth is concerning eternal life or anything else, it is imperative that we search the scriptures. The Bible tells us much about the people in Berea and Thessalonica. The Bereans are described thusly: "These were more noble than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the word with all readiness of mind, and searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so." (Acts 17:11). Many of the men and women who were Greeks in Berea believed.

We learn several things about these Bereans. First: They received the word with all readiness of mind which is divine evidence of being already born again because "...the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him: neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned." (I Cor. 2:14). These are spiritual men and women who received the word. Second: They believed which is another indication of the new birth: "Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth on him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation; but is passed from death unto life." (John 5:24). Third: They searched the scriptures daily which is a Bible command and His commandments are only to those who love God. (John 14:15). Those who love God are born of God. (I John 4:7). Those Jesus addressed in John 5 had not the love of God.

Unlike the Jews that Jesus addressed in John 5:42, the Bereans had the love of God wrought in their hearts; consequently, they could hear the word, receive the word, believe the word, and search the word. What is to be gained in searching the scripture if it is not eternal life? The scriptures are profitable to the man of God for doctrine, reproof, correction, and instruction in righteousness. (II Tim. 3:17). These are vital in the spiritual growth of the child of God as Peter plainly tells us to not be led away with the error of the wicked and fall from steadfastness in the faith "But grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. To him be glory both now and for ever. Amen." (II Pet. 3:18)

If we are to grow in grace and knowledge, we must tap this spiritual gold mine by studying the scriptures on a daily basis as Timothy was instructed. Solomon tells us to receive God's words, hide commandments of God in heart, incline our hearts to wisdom, apply our hearts to understanding, and cry after knowledge. (Prov. 2:1-3). When this formula is followed to find the hidden treasures of God, the result is profound for the seeker of truth. "If thou seekest her as silver, and searchest for her as for hid treasures; Then shalt thou understand the fear of the LORD, and find the knowledge of God." (Prov. 2:4-5). Eternal life is one thing and the "knowledge" of eternal life and how it is bestowed is quite another. Life and immortality are not given in or through the scriptures (gospel) but are brought to light for the born again child of God. (II Tim. 1:10). Grow in knowledge as strong trees of righteousness for John had no greater joy than to find God's beloved walking in truth.

Paul tells Timothy that from a child he had known the scriptures which were able to make him wise unto salvation. (II Tim. 3:15). Paul told him to "lay hold on eternal life" whereunto he had also been called and had witnessed a good confession before many witnesses. (I Tim. 6:12). If I laid hold on some other person's Bible, I would be a thief. However, I could lay hold on my Bible and all would be well. The conclusion is that we cannot truly lay hold on anything that we aren't in possession of. Many children of God have eternal life but haven't laid hold on it; either because of a lack of access to the scriptures or as a result of disobedience. Yes, search the scriptures, not to obtain eternal life, but to reap all the blessings and benefits that can be enjoyed by complying with their instructions. (Elder Larry Wise)

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PHARISEES

The Pharisees were a religious sect of the Jews who were zealous in the keeping of the law of Moses and believed in the resurrection of the body in that great day.

As a result of their keeping the law better than many others, they were very self-righteous. This means they were confident of their own righteousness. There were some Pharisees who believed in Jesus but do so secretly for fear of their peers.

Jesus warned the disciples to beware of the leaven of the Pharisees. *"Then Jesus said unto them, Take heed and beware of the leaven of the Pharisees and of the Sadducees."* Matthew 16:6 After the disciples had trouble understanding he further explained. *"Then understood they how that he bade them not beware of the leaven of bread, but of the doctrine of the Pharisees and of the Sadducees."* Matthew 16:12

The doctrine of the Pharisees is dangerous to believe and practice. We are to show humility not false religion. They perceived they were better and more righteous than others. Paul was a Pharisee before his experience with Jesus on the road to Damascus. Christ described their pedigree in Luke 11:39 *"And the Lord said unto him, Now do ye Pharisees make clean the outside of the cup and the*

platter; but your inward part is full of ravening and wickedness."

True religion does not allow us to feel superior to others, but as sinners saved by the grace of God. Even in the boldness in Christ of the Apostle Paul, he never did gloat in himself but rather remembered his poverty in the flesh. *"This is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jesus came into this world to save sinners; of whom I am chief."* 1st Tim. 1:15 How can you feel better than others when you feel to be chief of sinners?

A Pharisee desired that Jesus dine with him. When he entered into the house a woman who was identified as a sinner came in and began to wash Jesus's feet with tears. *"Now when the Pharisee which had bidden him saw it, he spake within himself, saying, This man, if he were a prophet, would have known who and what manner of woman this is that toucheth him: for she is a sinner."* Luke 7:39 Jesus taught him that those who are forgiven more, love more.

We should not pray as a Pharisee. The Pharisee's prayer is shown in the book of Luke. *"The Pharisee stood and prayed thus with himself, God, I thank thee, that I am not as other men are, extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as this publican."* Luke 18:11 The Pharisee judged himself by other men, not by Jesus Christ. When we see how far we come from perfection we pray as the publican. *"...God be merciful to me a sinner."* Luke 18:13

The doctrine of the preserved in Christ is a beautiful Bible truth, *"Jude, the servant of Jesus Christ, and brother of James, to them that are sanctified by God the Father; and preserved in Jesus Christ, and called:"* Jude 1 This leaves no place for self righteousness, no place to compare ourselves to others.

On the other hand the false and perverted doctrine of perseverance is a Pharisee doctrine. This doctrine claims that by the grace of God we live such a holy life that we are more holy than others. It allows people to compare themselves to others, rather than to the Lord. This is especially true toward sinners, or to the disobedient. It allows people to feel like a Pharisee.

Thank God, the true Church has always rejected the leaven of the Pharisees. --Guy Hunt

NOT WEAK AND FEEBLE

He brought them forth also with silver and gold: and there was not one feeble person among their tribe."—
Psalm 105:37.

By reading this chapter it will be seen that David is rehearsing God's providence in delivering national Israel from bondage, and His faithfulness to fulfill His promise to Abraham and his seed. When we consider God in His going forth to His people in providence, it constrains us to adore Him for His goodness and mercy. How destitute were these poor bondmen as they labored under their hard taskmasters—no money in their purses, no bread in their barns for themselves and little ones. But their God owned all the silver and gold, and could so work in providence that a large portion of it should be shared by these destitute and oppressed slaves. No matter how it came, God sent it to them.

I heard once of a poor destitute widow whose good supply became exhausted and she bowed in her humble home in prayer to God of providence and asked Him to provide for her. A wicked boy passing by heard her and thought to have some fun. He bought a box of provisions and set them on the doorstep of the poor widow's home. Later he came back, and she was telling him how good the Lord had been to her in answering her prayer. The boy then told her it was not the Lord, but he had bought the box himself. "No matter," says she, "the devil may have brought it, but the Lord sent it."

Now when we dig down in this text for the spiritual lesson, how sweet are our thoughts concerning God's providence toward His people redeemed by the blood of Christ. Is He not the same God of providence that provided for Israel? Many of God's people are hard pressed financially—often don't see where their supplies will come from. But as He turned gold and silver into the hands of the destitute anciently, so He can and does not. He will do to trust.

But now we come to the remarkable expression, "There was not one feeble person among them." How can we appreciate this expression? In the work of regeneration, when God gives a poor sinner faith to lay hold on Christ as his own personal Savior, how strong he is in love to Jesus. No feebleness here. The same could be said about devotion to His service. His mouth is filled with praises. It is later on that he becomes feeble in praise and devotion. Could it not be said, too, that his zeal toward God was strong? He can now walk and not faint; run and not be weary. He can mount up on eagles' wings above the storm clouds. The child of God is then in his first love.


But sad to say, we often leave our first love, we

Ps. 89:19

Psalms 89:33 says, "Nevertheless my loving kindness will I not utterly take from him, nor suffer my faithfulness to fail. My covenant will I not break, nor alter the thing that is gone out of my lips". Here is recorded the words of David referring to God's people and denominating them as "His Seed" and "His Children". It speaks of God's pledge and His Oath to his promise through ONE THAT IS MIGHTY. In verse 37 it is said that these particulars are as a "faithful witness in Heaven". It is and has been argued by our loyal opposition that "God owes to all men a chance to be saved". First of all let me say that sinners are not saved by CHANCE. Every sinner that has ever been saved was saved and is saved on purpose or by Gods predetermined intent. Second is the fact that God is not under obligation to any in the sense of the offer of eternal salvation to them. The natural man is DEAD in trespasses and in sin and not only will not come to Christ but CANNOT come to Christ to make the so-called CHANCE effective. God cannot operate on a CHANCE system else he has no PURPOSE or intent. The very nature and character of God will not permit such. If we are to be comforted and instructed by the word of God in this day or any other day we must let it say what it says and not what we want it to say or think it should say. It is my opinion, and I think a sound one, that the Spirit of God does not communicate to the mind of the child of God any doctrine that is NOT ALREADY CONTAINED IN THE SCRIPTURES. He makes men wise to what is written NOT BEYOND it.

The main thought of the religious minded people of our day is that SALVATION is a simple transaction that can be attended to by letting God know what your intentions are and as soon as the sinner has done that the Lord then proceeds to start the process in the work of salvation. Now I realize there are variations in that thinking but I think I have fairly presented the foundation of and the beginning point of most religious minded individuals. My position is that Christ has redeemed all that shall be saved and that the redemption under consideration is ETERNAL REDEMPTION. It is ETERNAL in its duration. The objects of that redemption stand JUST and JUSTIFIED. These are special terms that refer to legal procedure. This signifies the act of pronouncing one clear from charges that may have been pronounced against him. This principle is distinctly used in scripture. It is a judicial pronouncing of those whom Christ has redeemed from under the law as legally perfect and that forever Christ by His one offering "hath perfected forever" them that are sanctified by that ONE offering (Heb.10:12-14). HE

hath "Obtained eternal redemption for us". HE obtained that for us that is ETERNAL in its duration. HE obtained that by and through the avenue of HIS WORK. I would say that I believe in the pre-existent purpose of God. In his own purpose He determined beforehand and made full provision for the salvation of HIS people through Christ the surety. In that surety and because of that surety, who is Christ, the demands of the law could not and cannot stand nor be held against even one of the elect of God. If the scripture sustains such a proposition, and I am convinced it does, then CHANCE does NOT and cannot enter the picture. I say that if what is said by modern religion is true, if salvation is by Chance, if it comes by opportunity, if it begins with the sinner signing up so to speak for the transaction, if the work is based on conditions met by those who are dead in sin, etc. then I say heaven has a poor CHANCE of being inhabited.

In the great light of truth the work of salvation by Grace becomes more than a theoretical speculation but rather the living manifestation that God himself has and does bring us into a living relationship with him by an act of HIS OWN volition (2nd Cor. 3:3) and those embraced in that work are ALL drawn to God according to St. John 6:44 and are "all taught of God". (St. Jn.6:45). THEY ARE TAUGHT OF GOD! They are taught with a teaching of GOD and that teaching under consideration is only by HIM. The teaching that is referred to is above and beyond the ability of men to teach or to perform. 1st Jn. 2:27 in no uncertain terms gives us the order, "The anointing which ye have received of HIM abideth in YOU and ye need not that ANY MAN TEACH YOU". So here is a teaching that comes without the need of men doing the teaching. The same text tells me that this "is the TRUTH and is no LIE". We believe that Christ's death was one of appointment or ordination; NOT CHANCE. God's particular character could not allow him to purpose his only begotten Son as the appointed and ordained sacrifice for sin, which none will deny, with no assurance of a successful outcome. I read that the bible says that "HE gave himself for OUR SINS that HE might deliver us from this present evil world according to the will of God and our Father" Gal. 1:4. The question has been asked before; "Can men or angels make any person a redeemed one whom Christ has not redeemed?" I am not aware of who asked that question but it is one that is paramount yet simple and needs careful consideration by all.

None of this process is by CHANCE. A young man told me awhile back (who is not a Primitive Baptist), "Brother Ricky, I was told if I would get saved, put my faith in him and come to Christ I would have no doubts as far as my salvation was concerned, I would be delivered from my sinful thoughts, my depraved desires, the love of sin and find a blessed assurance

that I had never known before and yet I find often times I still fall back and find myself in bad way.” Of course the young was a child of God; I believe he was and is a child of God and none could convince me otherwise but he had been given the wrong information. May I say that being born again does not make us dead to the propensity of sin. Paul had the same experience read Romans chapter seven. We, like HE, have a natural affection or nature that afflicts us even after our experience of Grace. The natural man rises up and often times over takes us in ways that bring particular sadness, disappointment, difficulty and depression. The list is too vast to enumerate and the examples are abundant. Grace has no delight in sin but delights in the law of God after the inward man and promotes conformity to His will and word yet the struggle between those two natures is REAL, and the warfare it produces, so often brings us to into captivity. In my own experience I can thank the Lord that Isaiah 63:1 says that in righteousness God declared that He that was glorious in His apparel was also “Mighty to Save”. Amen.
