FROM THE PASTORS DESK

The rich young ruler came to Jesus wanting to know what good thing he could do to have eternal life. Jesus, knowing his covetous nature, told him to keep the commandments of Moses. The young man said he had from his youth but what did he lack. Jesus told him to sell all he had, give to the poor and he would have treasure in heaven and to come follow Him. The ruler went away sorrowful for he had great possessions. When Jesus told the disciples that it was easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God, the disciples were amazed and asked Jesus. "who then could be saved"? This was Jesus' response, "But Jesus beheld them, and said unto them, With men this is impossible; but with God all things are possible." (Matt. 19:26)

It is impossible for men to do anything to obtain eternal life as they are dead in sins. However with God, it is indeed possible because nothing is too hard for the Lord. God promised Abraham that he would have a son and by nature that would have been impossible. Abraham was old and Sarah's womb was dead but God fulfilled His promise. The promised son, Isaac was born, at the set time that Abraham was told in spite of the deadness of the body of Abraham and the deadness of Sarah's womb. This birth was contrary to nature.

God promised to send His Son, made of a woman, made under the law, to redeem those under the law. God foretold exactly how He would send His Son. "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." (Isa. 7:14) Matthew tells us that the name Emmanuel is interpreted "God with us." (Matt. 1:23) Ordinary conception is between a man and woman but this wasn't any ordinary conception or birth. Job asked the question long ago, "Who can bring a clean thing out of an unclean? not one." (Job 14:4) With men this is impossible, but with God it is possible. Jesus was conceived by the Holy Ghost in the womb of the virgin, Mary, as a clean thing out of an unclean thing. The angel told Mary, "...that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God." (Luke 1:35) This was a very miraculous sign that had been promised whereas a young woman (not a virgin) bringing forth a son would have been a very ordinary occurrence.

Jesus Christ is the unspeakable gift from God that was born sinless of a virgin but died for sins on the cross; not His own sins but the sins of His elect family. Just as the promise of Isaac, and Jesus came to pass so will the promise of eternal life be realized by the family of God. Why? It is because there are some things that are impossible with God. It is impossible for God to lie; consequently, we have this blessed assurance, "In hope of eternal life, which God, that cannot lie, promised before the world began;" (Titus 1:2) We can count on every promise of God because the scripture declares, "For all the promises of God in him are yea, and in him Amen, unto the glory of God by us." (II Cor. 1:20)

Jesus was born on time, died on time, and was resurrected on time. The grave could not hold the Saviour; it just wasn't possible. Luke writes that He was delivered by the determinate counsel and foreknowledge of God, crucified and slain and then raised from the dead. "Whom God hath raised up, having loosed the pains of death: because it was not possible that he should be holden of it." (Acts 2:24) God hath sworn with an oath to David that of the fruit of his loins he would raise up Christ to set on his throne which would be accomplished with Jesus being raised from the grave. "He seeing this before spake of the resurrection of Christ, that his soul was not left in hell, neither his flesh did see corruption." (Acts 2:31) With men this is impossible but not with the Almighty God whom we worship.

The scriptures give us the record of Jesus' birth and what He came to do which was attested to by the thrice Holy God before the world began. John writes, "For there are three that bear record in heaven, the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost: and these three are one." (I John 5:7) To what did the eternal three bear record? John answers this question: "And this is the record, that God hath given to us eternal life, and this life is in his Son." (I John 5:11)

That eternal life the young ruler thought he could obtain by doing something good was impossible with him but not with God. The **record** is verified in the inspired word of God that eternal life is a gift which resides in none other than Jesus Christ, the Son of God. "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Rom. 6:23) Scripture verifies scripture; therefore, is not of any private interpretation. To us a child is born; unto us a son is given. (Isa.9:6) (Elder Larry Wise)

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GOD SOVEREIGN IN SALVATION

"Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven." We are taught in many places to be submissive to the will of God. We never enjoy the religion of Christ more than when we are fully submissive to the will of God. The Lord has a will concerning the salvation of sinners, and had a will concerning it before the world began. Either the will of God determines who shall be saved, or the will of man determines it. John says, it is not "of the will of the flesh, nor the will of man, but of God" (John 1:13). So we are not left to uncertainty as to this matter.

It is fitting that this matter should be entirely with Him for several reasons. It was the Lord that died the death of the cross to save sinners. He shed His own precious blood to save sinners, and therefore this matter should be decided by Him. Another reason is—Heaven is His, all His; everything there belongs to Him; and we concede that men may do what they please with their own, and if men say, how much more the Lord? His wisdom and power fit Him to decide this matter more than any other thing.

If any of earth's millions had any claim or could show any reason why they should be included then the case would be different; but if no one has such a claim it appears that He may do as He will with His own, and so give it to whom He will.

He says, "I will have mercy on whom I will have mercy." We are not permitted to point to any as too bad—too vile for His mercy. We read of some of the worst that were favored.

"He to whom most is forgiven will love the most." Here is one result of the salvation of the chief of sinners. They will love much. "I come not to call the righteous but sinners." Those who feel that they are poor, vile sinners will lose nothing by the whole matter being left to the Lord.

Who can say that more would be saved if it were left to the will of man? Or who can say *certainly* that any would have been saved if all had been left to the will of man? If the sinner is to decide whether he will be saved, he must do so while he is a sinner—while he is "dead in sin," and who can say that such a sinner would ever so choose? And if sinners, dead in sin, would never make such a choice and yet the whole scheme of salvation should be left to depend on them, what a great failure it all would be!

If the design of God is His own glory in the salvation of sinners, would His glory be more secure if all were left to depend on man? Each one of us knows something of our proneness to go astray—to forget God and all our duties to Him. Is it best for us that all be left to ourselves? "What was there in you that could merit esteem—or give the Creator delight?—Twas 'even so Father,' you ever must sing—'because it seemed good in Thy sight'." It becomes us to say concerning this matter, "Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven."

If it were the will of God to save all the race, we would not find fault; but if God's object is His own glory, who can certainly say that this end would be better secured in this way? The *justice* of God as well as His mercy is important. If all were left under the law and under its curse, then the *justice* of God would be sure, but not His mercy; on the other hand if all were redeemed and saved, His *mercy* would have been seen but not His justice.

It will appear that God is in earnest about the salvation of His people if we will consider all He has done to secure it. "He spared not His own Son," and "how shall He not with Him freely give us all things?" Who can answer this question? God certainly thought of this and of all things necessary to bring it about long before time. He has "prepared" a place for us. The great wedding supper is prepared. The robes, the mansions—all are prepared for the redeemed; but if it all depends on their choice of God, see how great a failure it would be?

In free governments like ours, we find that the elect are inferior to the elector. The people are the electors and the elect take the place of servants. So, in the matter in hand, God is never called the "elect," but He is often represented as choosing or electing, and we are over and over presented as "the elect" of the "chosen." To make all depend on the sinner's choosing God is to invert the order, and make the sinner sovereign, and God dependent.

MORE THAN ONE WORLD

"They are of the world: therefore they speak of the world, and the world heareth them" (1st John 4:5).

Those who claim that the gospel they preach is the means God uses to save people in an eternal sense say that the world, the entire Adamic family, can hear their gospel and receive it. But notice John says, "He that is not of God heareth not us." So John was not one of those who speaks of the world and the world heareth them. "We are of God: he that knoweth God heareth us." Now who is right in this matter, those that are of the world and speak of the world and the world heareth them, or John, who taught as quoted above?

They cry, "The Son died for everyone," and then quote John 3:16 to prove their point, they think. But this time John later records the words of Christ when He said, "I pray not for the world, but for them which thou hast given me." Wouldn't it be somewhat strange to die for the world, and then say He prayed not for that same world? Die for a people He would not pray for? I John 5:19 says, "And we Know that we are of God, and the whole world lieth in wickedness." Here is a world that is separate from God and the people or the world that is of God.

I wonder why they that are of the world and who speak of the world so often, never read in connection with John 3:16 of that world which is not with God's people and for whom Christ would not pray? Notice this: "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world" (I John 2:15). Who is the *world* of this verse? There certainly must be some human beings embraced in the term *world*, but we are taught not to love the world, neither the things of the world. I cannot understand why people make such a display of the world in John 3:16 and then never undertake to show the harmony in these verses quoted in this article.

The Bible states that God loved Jacob and hated Esau. Is Esau in John 3:16? If he was, why would God say He hated him? All who are embraced in John 3:16 are loved of God. Was there any difference in Esau and Jacob in the mind of Christ when He died for the world? The Bible declares that God changes not, if He loved Esau, and He changes not, and there is no way you can separate him from the love of God, then he will be saved. Those who really study the Bible know it teaches that God's work is

perfect, and also whatsoever He doeth stands for ever.

Christ was made to be sin for His people, the entire world of John 3:16; those He loved. As He *did not love* Esau, Esau was not in the world of John 3:16, for He *loved* that world. Who then are embraced in the world He died for? Those embraced in the election of God before the foundation of the world (Eph. 1:4). "According as He hath chosen us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love." Now keep in mind that God's work is perfect. Nothing can be added to it nor anything taken from it. This being true, and His people being chosen to this end, that they should be holy and without blame before Him in love, then they *will be* presented to God the Father without blemish or any such thing.

Notice this: "That was the true Light, which lighteth every man that cometh into the world." That is, the world of John 3:16. He did not lighten any of those in that world for whom He would not pray. If He did, then that work stands forever, and if such a man should go down to eternal destruction he would have to go there with his sins atoned.

"For I cam down from heaven, not to do mine own will, but the will of Him that sent me. And this is the Father's will which hath sent me, that of all which He hath given me I should lose nothing, but should raise it up again at the last day." He came to do His Father's will. He was made to be sin for His people, having obtained eternal redemption for them. Now the question is this: Did He do this for every individual from the beginning of the world to the end of the world or this age? We know that in connection with this if one for whom Christ died goes to eternal torment he will go there with his sins put away, Christ being made sin for him. I am saying that John 3:16 embraces those He loved, and those He loved with an everlasting love cannot be separated from His love. Their number, as the sand of the sea shore and the stars of heaven, is innumerable. According to the Bible there is a great many of them.

In any season of the year, in every age of time, in joy or sorrow, in life or death, the message of the coming and accomplishment of Jesus Christ brings joy and peace. The eternal love of God reaches down, in the person of his son, to mortal men, women, and little children; his holy angels bringing tidings of great joy.

The angel, Gabriel, many years before Jesus was born, appeared to Daniel, the prophet, to give him skill and understanding, also to bring the blessed message, "Daniel thou art greatly beloved." Daniel 8:16, 9:21-23. (Oh, for the grace to convey and portray to the household of faith, his children, "Thou art greatly beloved.")

About 850 years after Daniel's prophecy while Zacharias burned incense in the holy place, there appeared unto him an angel of the Lord, standing on the right side of the altar. In God's word where angels appear to men, such holy presence fills with fear and awe, however, on such occasions the beginning of the message is "fear not"; in the gospel how precious is the phrase "fear not".

In this wonderful visit of the angel. Zacharias and Elisabeth were promised a son, and instructed to call his name John. The angel was Gabriel (Luke 1:19) "I am Gabriel, that stand in the presence of God; and am sent to speak unto thee and to show thee these glad tidings."

God shall give unto him the throne of his father David: And he shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end."

This everlasting kingdom stands firm in the face of all unbelief and opposition—the gates of hell shall not prevail against it; it came through the dark ages, it reaches to all kindred, tongue, people, and nations. Grace, irresistible everlasting love and power bring people in the kingdom and all the powers of evil cannot prevent it or remove it.

In addressing again the people of his pasture and the sheep of his hand, the following and fundamental with us—an all wise, all powerful God; Jesus Christ came in the flesh; He was born of a virgin; Salvation is by Grace; Jesus Christ is head of the church; All that believe in him should be careful to maintain good works; and He reigns forever and ever.

May he bless each of you in his own blessed and special way now and in the days ahead.

"And the voice spake unto him again the second time, What God hath cleansed, that call not thou common." (Acts 10:15)

The Lord was teaching Peter a very valuable lesson. The Jews were accustomed to looking upon Gentiles as dogs. The Lord was sending Peter to the house of a man that was unlawful for a Jew to enter. But the householder had been cleansed by the Lord.

It is a common custom of men to look upon others with a less favourable view that they hold for themselves. Yet, we ought not to consider those common whom God hath cleansed.

The only way for poor sinners to be looked upon with the favor of God, is to be seen through the cleansing blood of Jesus Christ. Those who Christ shed his blood for are not common but of royalty. "...Unto him that loved us, and washed us from our sins in his own blood, And hath made us kings and priests unto God and his Father, to him be glory and

dominion for ever and ever. Amen." Revelations 1:5-

The Pharisee who went up to the temple to pray and prayed within himself, "God, I thank thee, that I am not as other men are..." Luke 18:11. He looked upon other men as being common or unclean, especially the publican standing afar off. But the publican was of royal blood.

The devil is in the business of helping God's children feel worthless. When we grow old or infirm and have to have help with our daily life, we may feel worthless. The devil even convinces some people they are so worthless that they take their own lives. Yet, when we have in our heart the hope of heaven we are not worthless or common, but our wealth and riches are in the Lord.

There is nothing wrong with our anticipation of being relieved of sin and pain and our souls being in the presence of God. That recognizes that we feel we are royalty. But, we should also be aware as we journey here, that our lives as they are lived in honor to God are worthwhile to those who are fellow travelers. Many times during my life I have sold myself short of what I mean to others. When trouble or sickness comes, so many show their love and affection that it humbles our souls. I see the saints of God each day who have no idea how much they mean to me or others. They just cannot understand that they would even be missed.

Since my sickness began, I have had such an outpouring of love from Primitive Baptists and friends outside the Church, that I feel all warm inside and desire to finish my course with joy.

We should always know that as we travel the Christian Pathway, our fellow travelers are those whose names are written in heaven. Not one is common or unclean because God has cleansed them.

Neither do those who claim to be preachers of the gospel have a right to consider to tell someone they are bound for hell. Just because they have not followed the same rules does not mean they are common or unclean. As Peter learned, just because someone had not followed the Jewish law and been circumcised did not mean God had not cleansed them. When Jesus washed us from our sins in his own blood, the cleansing job was done. He did not leave it to us or someone else. What Gld has cleansed is totally clean.

We were cleansed from sin as Jesus cleansed the leper. We were immediately clean. Men needed to stop telling others to accept Jesus. Those who he cleansed are accepted of God in Christ. "To praise of the glory of his grace, wherein he hath made us accepted in the beloved." Ephesians 1:6

CHRIST OUR SURETY

Since Brother Radicliff asked our opinion as to whether Christ is our security, or our surety (see his letter elsewhere in this paper), we will offer a few of our thoughts on the subject. We would say, however, that we understand Christ to be the surety for His people, and have always understood this to be the doctrine of the Primitive Baptists as a denomination.

The very idea of Christ making atonement for His people on the cross is evidence that He was their surety. It is generally understood that if A is security for the payment of a debt owed by B. the creditor will look to B for the payment of the debt just as much as he looks to A. He holds B equally responsible with A. But if A is surety for B, then when the debt is due the creditor makes demand of A for the payment or settlement of the debt. He looks to A for settlement. Thus the Saviour becomes surety for His people. All their sins were charged to His account. Their sins are not charged to them and to Christ jointly, as partners in the affair, so that demand for payment could be made upon both. "The Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all."—Isaiah 53:6. All their sins, all their iniquities, were laid on Him; they were charged to His account, so that demand was made of Him for payment of the debt which they owed to divine justice. Thus He became their substitute; He was offered in their stead. In that sense He was their substitute. All their sins being charged to Christ and laid on Him, the law holds no demands against them. The demand was all against Christ, and He met every demand, and paid the debt in full. "The Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all"-the demand was that He pay it all, and this was upon the principle that He had assumed the debt. If He did assume the debt, it then became His, and was not, therefore, a debt owed by them both. He took upon Himself all their indebtedness, paying what they owed and setting them free therefrom.

In Paul's letter to Philemon (Philemon 18) he said, concerning Onesimus, "If he hath wronged thee, or oweth thee ought, put that on mine account." If it was put on Paul's account, it was not put on an account against Onesimus. Paul became his surety, He did not say, "If Onesimus fails to pay, or is not able to pay it all, I will pay what he lacks," but he said "put it on mine account"-that is, charge it against me; do not charge it against him. This Christ became surety for His people. Their sins were all charged on His account.

This blessed truth is a comfort and consolation to us, but time forbids us writing more. Go on, dear brother, proclaiming the truth that Christ is our surety.

APOSTLE PETER Part 2

2 Peter 1:16: "For we have not followed cunningly devised fables, when we made known unto you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but were eyewitnesses of his majesty."

We continue our writing on the Apostle Peter. In this article we look at him being a witness to Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God. As our verse above says he and the other apostles were eyewitnesses of his majesty (greatness). We will now look at a few of these events. Sometimes all twelve saw his miracles and sometimes there was only a few that witness it. Peter seems to have been one that the Lord particularly wanted to witness the events. We notice this in Mark 5:35-43. In the miracle of raising the voung damsel from the dead. A man named Jairus a ruler of the Synagogue in the area. He pleaded with the Lord to come and heal his daughter, but by the time he had made his plea to Jesus news came that she had passed away. The Lord tells Jairus to just continue his belief in him. Jesus then began his journey to go where her body lay. However he didn't allow all of his followers to come with him just three of his apostles. Mark 5:37 And he suffered no man to follow him, save Peter, and James, and John the brother of James. Upon arriving at the house where the damsel is they find that there is a disturbance among those that had gathered. The paid mourners and wailers were causing a mournful scene because of the death of the damsel.

Mark 5:39-42: "And when he was come in, he saith unto them, Why make ye this ado, and weep? the damsel is not dead, but sleepeth. And they laughed him to scorn. But when he had put them all out, he taketh the father and the mother of the damsel, and them that were with him, and entereth in where the damsel was lying. And he took the damsel by the hand, and said unto her, Talitha cumi; which is, being interpreted, Damsel, I say unto thee, arise. And straightway the damsel arose, and walked; for she was of the age of twelve years. And they were astonished with a great astonishment."

Notice that Jesus put everybody out except the mother and father, Peter and the two disciples. Now the Lord didn't need these people to assist him in the miracle. The Lord simply told the damsel to arise and she did. Everyone in that room was put there for the purpose of witnessing the miracle that our Lord performed.

We now go to the scriptures where it is recorded about the glorious transfiguration of our Lord. First let's see who was there to see the transfiguration.

Matthew 17:1. "And after six days Jesus taketh Peter, James, and John his brother, and bringeth them up into an high mountain apart," Again the Apostle Peter is here to witness another miracle of our Lord.

Matthew 17:2-5: "And was transfigured before them: and his face did shine as the sun, and his raiment was white as the light. And, behold, there appeared unto them Moses and Elias talking with him. Then answered Peter, and said unto Jesus, Lord, it is good for us to be here: if thou wilt, let us make here three tabernacles; one for thee, and one for Moses, and one for Elias. While he yet spake, behold, a bright cloud overshadowed them: and behold a voice out of the cloud, which said, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased; hear ye him."

This transfiguration is what Peter is talking about in our opening text. Telling the people that you are not following a cunningly devised fable. A fable is a false story. Peter would later say as an Apostle "I saw these things as they happen! I heard the voice of God the Father say This is my beloved Son.". Jesus Christ is real. Jesus Christ is truly the son of God!

These events are just a few of what Peter witnessed as he walked with the Lord. So what was the purpose for Peter and others to witness these great events?

I believe the answer can be found in these scriptures: Luke 1:1: "Forasmuch as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us," Luke is writing to his friend Theophilus. He is writing for the purpose of "setting in order a declaration of those things believed among us". This is what we believe; these recorded events as written by eye witnesses of what they saw. Luke 1:2: "Even as they delivered them unto us, which from the beginning were eyewitnesses, and ministers of the word;"

Now Luke sums up the purpose for having these eye witnesses. Luke 1:4: "That thou mightest know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed."

Those "things" are Jesus miraculously raising the dead. Causing the lame to walk. To give sight to one that was born blind! Peter and the other apostles are saying we saw these things, they are certain!

Certainty means "security" or "undoubted truth". These events were not done in a corner, where no one witnessed them. We were there; we saw these things with our very own eyes. You are not following after cunningly devised fables. These stories are all true. Jesus is the Christ. The Son of the Living God!
