# FROM THE PASTORS DESK

Jesus is the eternal Son of God and is from everlasting to everlasting, just like His Heavenly Father. (Psalm 90:2) He was there with God when the world and everything therein was created. (John 1:1-2) He left the glory He had with the Father and condescended to be born of a virgin and become flesh and blood. "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth." (John 1:14)

It was flesh and blood that transgressed the law of God in the Garden of Eden and brought sin into the world. This necessitated that a flesh and blood man must pay the sin debt that had been incurred because of sin. The wages of sin is death said Paul in Rom. 6:23 and if not for Jesus Christ being made flesh His people would experience the second death and eternal separation from God. Heb. 2:14 says, "Forasmuch then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, he also himself likewise took part of the same; that through death he might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil:"

Jesus took part of the same flesh and blood; He was flesh and blood but without sin because He was conceived by the Holy Ghost in the womb of Mary who had never known a man in an intimate way. Of course this had been prophesied many centuries before when it was promised that a virgin would conceive. "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." (Isa. 7:14) Immanuel is "God with us" as Jesus was God made manifest in the flesh. (I Tim. 3:16)

Paul tells us, "The first man is of the earth, earthy: the second man is the Lord from heaven." (I Cor. 15:47) There have been more than two men on earth but Adam was the first and Jesus was the second. This is used I feel because Adam is the federal head of all humanity whereas Jesus is the head of the entire family of God. Adam came from the earth but Jesus came from heaven. Adam is a figure of Him (Jesus) that was to come. (Rom. 5:14) Sin condemned man and couldn't be removed by any but the incarnate Son of God. "For what the law could not do, in that it was weak through the flesh, God sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and for sin, condemned sin in the flesh:" (Rom.8:3)

Jesus Christ came into the world at the appointed time to redeem (buy, rescue from loss) His people and pay that which no flesh and blood sinner could possibly pay. "But when the fulness of the time was come, God sent forth his Son, made of a woman, made under the law, To redeem them that were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons." (Gal. 4:4-5) Jesus was a flesh and blood man but no ordinary man. Men had offered sacrifices over and over in the Old Testament for sins but those sacrifices could never take away sin and its consequences. Then we read, "But this man, after he had offered one sacrifice for sins for ever, sat down on the right hand of God;" (Heb. 10:12)

One man brought sin into the world and by one man sin was atoned for and saints were made righteous. "For as by one man's disobedience many were made sinners, so by the obedience of one shall many be made righteous." (Rom. 5:19) Jesus made Himself of no reputation, in the likeness of men, and became obedient unto death. "But made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." (Phil. 2:7-8)

Jesus was both the Son of man and the Son of God. As the Son of man He represented us in His atoning sacrifice at Calvary. As the Son of God He represents God to us as a manifestation of His love. "In this was manifested the love of God toward us. because that God sent his only begotten Son into the world, that we might live through him." (I John 4:9) Then how is it that anyone is enabled to acknowledge Him as the Son of God. Peter told Christ, "... Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." (Matt. 16:16) Jesus told Peter how he was enabled to make this confession: "...Blessed art thou, Simon Barjona: for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father which is in heaven." (Matt. 16:17) No man can reveal Jesus as the Son of living God; it takes a higher power.

When Jesus comes the second time, He will come as the Son of man. He shall sit upon the throne of His glory. Before Him shall be gathered all nations and He shall separate them one from another as a shepherd divideth His sheep from the goats. (Matt. 25:31-33) The sheep on the right hand inherit the kingdom while the goats go into everlasting fire. (LW)

# \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* ELDER DALTON, AN IRISHMAN, AND A TRAIN CONDUCTOR

I was once traveling through the great state of Kentucky and had to change cars at a little place called Nortonville, a very small dismal looking place. I found upon my arrival there that I would have a seven hour wait; so I began walking up and down the platform trying to kill time as best I could. After a while an Irishman, ragged and dirty, came into the depot and took a seat. I noticed that he was all the time watching me, and I at last made up my mind that perhaps he was after no good; so I watched him with a very suspicious eye.

Finally he spoke, as I was passing the door, and said to me, "Come here and sit down. I want to talk to you." I thought, "I am not afraid of you," so I went and sat down. The first thing he did was to reach over and push my hat back. He remarked, "I like your countenance, and I feel like I want to talk to you." I said to him, "Talk on then; I will listen to you."

We began quoting scriptures and applying them. I soon found out he was well versed in the Scriptures and that he understood what they meant, if I did; so I became very much interested; and after he had talked on for some time on that line, he began to tell his experience. He went on to tell what a sinner he felt himself to be, and how he tried to beg the Lord to have mercy on him.

At last he said he was down on the railroad not far from that place, and he thought his time had come; he was shoveling dirt and trying to pray, until at last he felt that it was a case made out, there was no mercy for him; yet felt that God was just, and it was but right that he should be banished from His presence forever. But he said that all at once the trouble left him, light flashed all around him, and the first thing he knew, he was standing between the rails praising the Lord at the top of his voice, and the other hands all laughing at him; but he said that he did not care for their laughing, he loved the Saviour, and felt like he never could praise Him enough for what he had done for him.

When he got through I was crying for joy. I loved him and could not help it. I felt like he was my brother, so I told him what I hoped the Lord had done for me; and ere I was aware the train ran up and I had no ticket, and could only run and get on the train. I reached back, after I had got on the step of the car, to shake hands with him, and he kissed my hand before he would turn it loose.

I went in and took my seat, was still crying, could not guit, and the conductor came around taking up tickets. When he came to me I told him I had no ticket, but I would pay him the money; and while we were changing the money, he asked me what I was crying about. I tried to waive the subject by telling him that I didn't suppose he would know anything about it if I should tell him; so he went on. But after he had taken all of the tickets, and came back and sat down beside me, and asked me again what I was crying about. I tried to waive it off again by saying that it would be of no interest to him; but he urged me, saying, "I want to know anyhow." So I told him about the Irishman, and our talk; and before I was done, he was crying, and remarked to me, "I have been wanting to talk to someone on that subject for some time," and he began and told me his experience. Then I was filled with joy again; and before I reached my destination he came and handed my money back and told me any time I could strike his train not to get any ticket; "For," he said, "you are the first man I ever talked with that knew my feelings."

I never was permitted to meet either of them any more; but I felt then, and I feel now, that after a while I will meet them both in heaven, if I should ever be permitted to get to that good world; for no man ever taught those two men that lesson. ## WHAT HAPPENS AT DEATH?

It is a sad time for the survivors when they must say goodbye to a loved one who has passed away. However, we can rejoice in knowing that the child of God is in heaven in spirit and soul. The body of the deceased child of God is the only thing that is asleep when it is placed in the grave. The child of God is comprised of three components: 1. the body 2. the Spirit 3. the soul. Read what Paul wrote concerning these three to the Thessalonians, "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." (I Thess. 5:23) Death is a separation; not only is it a separation from family and friends but it is separation of the soul and spirit from the body and this constitutes death. James tells us, "For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also." (James 2:26)

Remember the spirit and soul are immortal and do not and cannot die. Our little finite minds cannot separate the soul and spirit as they are not the same but the living Word (Jesus Christ) can. (Heb. 4:16) What happens when the body dies which was made from the dust of earth? Solomon wrote, "Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was: and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it." (Eccl. 12:7) Where is God's dwelling place? It is in heaven. (I Kings 8:39) Then if the spirit returns unto God, it goes to heaven while the body goes to the grave to sleep until the time of the resurrection of the dead.

The spirit and soul will live in the presence of God at the death of the child of God. Moses' body had been buried for decades but Peter, James and John saw him and Elijah talking with Jesus when he was transfigured on the Mount. His spirit was talking with Jesus about His decease and in this miraculous transformation it had a body that could be recognized as Moses. Elijah didn't die but went up to heaven in a whirlwind but I am confident the body was changed.

Death for the wicked dead in sins is not as pleasant as it is for the child of God. We read the case of two men who died but with two different outcomes. There was a rich man who fared sumptuously every day and when he died, he was buried but his soul was in hell. The beggar was full of

sores and desired to be fed with crumbs from the rich man's table. When the beggar, named Lazarus, died he was carried by the angels to Abraham's bosom which was a Jewish term for heaven. The rich man's soul was in torments in the flames of hell but his body was buried. The beggar was at peace in heaven defined here as Abraham's bosom. (Luke 16:19-24) After Simeon held Jesus at about 40 days old, he, as the servant of God, was ready to depart in peace because his eyes had seen thy salvation. (Luke 2:29)

Paul prayed that the spirit, soul and body would be preserved blameless until the day of Jesus Christ as we have already seen in I Thess. 5:23. He then goes on to say regarding this prayer, "Faithful is he that calleth you, who also will do it." (I Thess. 5:24) The faithful God will always, without exception, perform what He has promised. The soul and spirit doesn't sleep. The Sadducees didn't believe in the resurrection but Jesus told them regarding Abraham Isaac and Jacob: "...God is not the God of the dead. but of the living." Their bodies were buried but they were alive in heaven. (Matt. 22:32) The only part of the child of God that will ever sleep is the body. Jesus referred to death as a sleep and Paul said we would not all sleep (die) but we would all be changed in a moment and in the twinkling of an eye at the second coming of the Lord.

In the resurrection of the body, the spirit, soul and body will be reunited in an incorruptible state. The final state of the saints in body, soul and spirit will be at God's right hand in the eternal kingdom of God. (Matt. 25:34) Their vile bodies will be changed and fashioned like unto the glorious body of Jesus Christ. (Phil. 3:21) The final state of the wicked will be on the left hand of God and banished into the lake of fire which is the second death. (Rev. 20:14-15) Without the grace of God we would all be in the lake of fire prepared for the devil and his angels, but we have a hope that at death we will be at peace in heaven while our bodies sleep. Paul states, "If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable." (I Cor. 15:19)

He saw of the travail of His soul and was satisfied. This was sweet and the great delight of the Son of God that He had most completely destroyed every opposing power against His beloved bride whom He loved and cherished so sacredly. He eats honey out of the slain carcass. "Take my yoke upon you, and learn of me; for I am meek and lowly in heart; and ye shall find rest for your souls." The lion of flesh must be denied daily, or we cannot be His disciples. Samson's strength was in his head, so the strength of all the chosen, the body of Christ, is in Christ, their spiritual head. Samson is also a type of Christ in his going to the Philistines, an inferior nation, to seek a bride for himself; so Jesus condescended to be made of a woman, made under the law, partook of our nature, sin excepted, to seek a bride for Himself among poor sinners. He became poor that we might be rich; He became humbled that we might be exalted; He died that we might live; He came to earth, took our place, and bore all our sins in His own body that we might spend eternity in Heaven. Bless His holy name—He wore our rags, that we might wear His spotless righteousness.

Samson slew more enemies in his death than in all his life, so Christ accomplished more (put away all our sins; satisfied every demand of the law) in His death than He did in all of the wonderful and most glorious and powerful works of His life. He slew the lion, we now are eating the honey. Jesus elevates us from our low estate, and makes us kings and priests, having washed us from our sins in His own blood.

Samson removing the gates of Gaza, perhaps is typical of Jesus Christ removing gates of death, and conquering every foe by His resurrection.

Jesus, our spiritual Samson, can reverse the cunning craftiness of man's fleshly nature (tying the foxes' tails together) by pouring out His judgments (firebrands) and thereby destroying all the works of their own hands that which grow out of the earth—man's works. The "I can't" spirit never leads to success.

But we should confine such teaching to the things of the world. We should not teach people that they can, by their own will power, take the kingdom of God. Heaven is not obtained by the will of man. As Elder Dalton once said, "We don't go to heaven by main strength and awkwardness." In the resurrection our bodies will not be raised by the will power of man; nor are we raised from death in sin to life in Christ Jesus by our will power. Lazarus came forth from the grave, but not by the power of his will. He says, "By the grace of God I am what I am." "It is not of him that willeth, nor of him that runneth, but of God that showeth mercy" (Rom. 9:16). Christ said to some, "Ye will not come to me that ye might have life." How long will it take a man to do that which he will not do?

But the "Free Willer" who believes that heaven and eternal glory is obtained by the power of the human will says, "Whosoever will may come." And so he can in the sense of the Scripture, "Whosoever will, let him take of the water of life freely." It is the water of life the willing one takes freely—not life. It is the living, naturally, who take the water of this material kingdom freely. Thirst makes us appreciate water. The living thirst—the dead do not. If we hunger and thirst for righteousness, and want to be more like Jesus and love and serve Him, we have been born again from above We are new creatures. We are spiritual as well as natural. We have a will to go to Jesus. "Whosoever will", whosoever has the will to come, let him come. God's children have the will when regenerated. The natural man has not the will. Paul says. "The natural man receiveth not the things of the spirit of God: for they are foolishness unto him; neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned.

And, dear reader, do not forget this coming to Jesus is not in order to get spiritual life, but because one has spiritual life and comes to Him to enjoy the water of life-to feast on the bread of life, to receive comfort, consolation, peace and all spiritual blessings. In order for one to go from death in sin to life in Jesus or go to Jesus in this sense, he must be drawn. No man can do this of himself. Christ says. "No man can come to me, except the Father which hath sent me draw him." He says again, "All that the Father giveth me shall come to me." Here is sure salvation for those who feel without strength-for every hungering, thirsting, sorrowing one who calls

upon the Lord for help, and worships Him in spirit and in truth. When they are weak, then are they strong (See II Cor. 12:10)—weak in self, strong in Jesus. Unless Christ was both God and man, there are many scriptures that simply do not make sense. For instance, Christ is spoken of in Revelation 22:16 as "the root and offspring of David." How could this be so if Christ were a mere man? It would be impossible. The only way He could be both the root and the offspring of David is for Him to be possessed of both Deity and manhood. As God He was the "root" of David. That is, He was the source of David's very origin and existence. But as man He was the "offspring" of David. That is, He descended from David in the sense that his legal parentage was of Davidic lineage, though He was shielded from Adamic pollution by virtue of the fact that His conception in the womb of the virgin Mary was "of the Holy Ghost" (Matt. 1:20), before there had been any marital relations between her and her husband Joseph.

Somebody once figured out that we have 35 million laws trying to enforce 10 Commandments.

How utterly ridiculous it is for us to try to remember 35 million laws. We know that it is, seemingly, impossible for us to remember all of the ten Commandments. We are prone to forget at least one of the Commandments at any given time. Usually we have let several slip from our memory. Sometimes we even relegate all of the Commandments in an obscure corner of our mind.

As we navigate the roads of our daily lives, we find that those 35 million laws have become stumbling blocks on the road of life. We are unable to abide by every single one of them. With so many laws on the books, it is inevitable that, to abide by one of the laws, we will sometimes be breaking another of those laws.

The conflict among the laws is reminiscent of the story about the man who was asked, under oath, if he had stopped beating his wife yet. The lawyer had demanded a simple "Yes" or "No" answer. Since the man had never been guilty of beating his wife, how was he to answer the question? An answer of "Yes" would be an admission of guilt; an answer of "No" would indicate that not only had he been beating her, but that he was still engaged in that activity!

It is better that we follow the ten Commandments, keeping them to the very best of our ability, than that we enact 35 million laws and expect everyone to follow all of them.

#### **FULL ASSURANCE**

Self-examination; what a solemn task! How important, yet how seldom we engage in it! We take all pains to examine our earthly estates but how indifferent and unconcerned about our title to the eternal inheritance. The apostle exhorts us to this duty, saying, "Examine yourselves, whether ye be in the faith, prove your own selves, how that Jesus Christ is in you, except ye be reprobates?" (2 Corinthians 13:5). What could be more comforting to one of the Lord's humble poor than assurance that he has "Christ within him—the hope of glory"? And this every child of God has, for "...if any man have not the Spirit of Christ. He is none of his. And if Christ be in you, the body is dead because of sin; but the Spirit is life because of righteousness" (Romans 8:9)

Some professionals regard it as wholly inconsistent with a gracious state to be perplexed with doubts and fears, but if a child of God may not doubt his interest in the Saviour, why did the apostle exhort his own brethren to "examine" themselves and "prove" themselves in order to determine their true state. On the other hand, I ask, may a child of God by selfexamination, arrive at a comfortable assurance of his interest in the blessed Redeemer? The apostle, we know, speaks of "the full assurance of faith (Hebrews 10:22), "the full assurance of hope", and "the full assurance of understanding" (Colossians 2:2). If these blessed estates are never enjoyed by the Lord's people in this life, why does the apostle speak of them and exhort to them? For he says, "And we desire that every one of you do show the same diligence to the full assurance of hope unto the end." Of all things conceivable, there is nothing in this life that can produce such peace and joy as a full assurance of a well-grounded hope in Christ.

The apostle does not exhort us to examine ourselves, then give us no rule to go by, but he says, "Know ye not your own selves, how that Jesus Christ is in you, except ye be reprobates?" As much to say that, if Christ is in us, there are marks and evidences of His indwelling, for all our graces, feelings, and exercises of mind, if we be CHRISTIANS, PROVE His presence in the soul, for Christ in the soul is like leaven in the meal. He will work until His mage is thoroughly impressed thereon. For it is written, "He which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Christ." But, again, the text proves that a child of God may not know himself, may not understand his true relationship to Christ and His people, and, hence, may not know how to classify himself, whether to claim God as his Father and the Lord's humble poor as his brethren or not. To know ourselves, if we be Christians, is a great blessing, a great blessing indeed. To know our relationship with God and His children, to be able to read in our exercises of mind, feelings, struggles, and soullongings, the proof—signs and marks

characterize the children of God. Some people profess to believe that Christ is in all men, striving with them, with a view toward their eternal salvation. This idea not *only* contradicts the apostle (Romans 8:10), but also robs the Lord's children of the sweetest evidences of their sonship. If He dwells in ALL men, then His presence in US is no proof whatsoever of saving grace in the soul, for then the vilest wretch can claim as much. But the Apostle Paul suspends the whole question upon the fact that "Christ is in you (us), except ye be reprobates".

when Jesus asked them, "What think ye of Christ? Whose son is he?" They had no idea that the next question was going to be so they trapped themselves when they replied, "The son of David." Then Christ flabbergasted them with the follow up query; "How then doth David in spirit call him Lord, saying, The Lord (referring to God the Father) said unto my Lord (referring to Christ), Sit thou on my right hand, till I make thine enemies thy footstool?" Then came the clincher, "If David then call Him Lord, how is he his son?" Naturally none of them could answer the question because they did not acknowledge Christ to be both God and man, in which case he could not have been both David's Lord and David's son (See Matt. 22:41-46).

In their judicial blindness and hardness of heart they never did see and understand that *Christ* was both the "root" and the "offspring" of David. In their darkened state they simply viewed this as an impossibility, just as do many people today. Therefore, "thou he had done so many miracles before them, yet they believed not on him" (John 12:37). True believers are not made by appeals to the natural senses, but by the exercise of divine and miraculous power upon the hearts and souls of men, who, up until that time are "dead in trespasses and sins" (See Eph. 2:1-5).

In closing I will refer briefly to two or three other references to both the Lordship and Sonship of Christ, emphasis mine: "His (God's) Son Jesus Christ our Lord, which was *made* of the seed of David *according to the flesh* and *declared to be the Son of God* with power." (Romans 1:3-4). Truly, the same One that made the world and everything else that was made (John 1:1-10). One of the great mysteries of godliness is that "God was manifest in the flesh" (I Tim. 3:16). Beyond question, He is the Great Emmanuel, "God with us" (Isa. 7:14 & Matt. 1:23).— *Editor*

## **DOCTRINES OF MEN**

# Mark 7:7: "Howbeit in vain do they worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men."

Jesus Christ is quoting from Isaiah 29:10-13 in the fulfilling of these scriptures about the Scribes and Pharisees of his day who were teaching man made doctrines. The word doctrine means "teaching or instructions." These men were not teaching about the true God, but about things that had come from their fleshly desires and wishes. They had so hidden the face of Christ in their doctrines that many did not recognize that Jesus was the Christ when he came among them. They had an entirely different teaching about Christ. Instead they taught such things as holiness comes in how well you wash the pots and pans. How they came and went to the market. Certain foods they ate etc... Yet they taught them nothing about the Son of Man that would come and take away their sins; the true story of salvation being in Christ. God gave the law to Moses in its purity at Sinai, and men corrupted it! By doing this God gave them over to slumber eyes that they could not see the truth. Romans 11:8; Matthew 15:7 The doctrines of men, and the true teachings of God are not the same This fact has always been true in the time that our Savior walked upon the earth, and it is true now in this day and age that we live in.

When Christ came and saved us by the sacrifice of his perfect life, he set up the gospel church to teach this pure fact in the New Testament church. Acts 2. Churches began in Jerusalem, then Antioch and spreading into Asia and Greece and Italy and throughout the empire. These churches began with a wonderful doctrine of salvation by the grace of God. Jesus had paid the price for his children, nothing else needed to be done for our eternal salvation. For roughly three centuries this was the doctrine taught by those churches. Then men began to introduce their doctrines. Doctrines such as eternal salvation by works. They began to say the Apostle Peter was the leader of the church, so someone had to succeed him as being the leader (Ironically Peter had been dead for three centuries!). We need a school for the preachers. Let's go and ask the school in Alexandria Egypt what they think about that. Not relying on God to call a man into the ministry, and giving him the necessary tools to preach the gospel.

Originally the church service was made up of three things that consisted of preaching, praying, and singing. Then men began to teach maybe the service needs a musical instrument. All these doctrines that men added became a great many things that took away the simplicity that is in the worshipping of Jesus Christ. 2 Corinthians 11:3 But I fear, lest by any means, as the serpent beguiled Eve through his subtilty, so your minds should be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ. Simplicity is an antonym of complicated. We don't need a school for simplicity, what the school is for is to teach the doctrines of men! No doubt it was Satan that beguiled some of our forefathers into adding their doctrines. Some did it out of pure evil; others did it out of being mistaken that this was for the glory of God to introduce these man made doctrines into the church. However, regardless of their intentions we need to keep those things out of our churches. Worship service should be all for the glory of God. Leave it at that and you keep the simplicity of Christ. Add one thing, and how long will it be before you will need to add another thing, and then another thing. The Jews thought the same thing in the age between Malachi and the first coming of Christ which was a period of about four hundred years. By the time that Christ did come, what man had added to the simple teaching of the law had more volumes than the World Book Encyclopedia which is about 29 volumes! Man made doctrines spread like kudzu and cover everything over, even the face of Jesus Christ. Let us keep away from the things of man and let us put forth the pure and uncorrupted things of Jesus Christ and him crucified. God bless you each and everyone.

#### THE PROPHETS

By Sylvester Hassell (Deceased)

The priests were at first Israel's teachers in God's statutes, acts and words (Lev. 10:11). But when under the judges the nation repeatedly apostatized, and no longer regarded the dumb acted lessons of the ceremonial law, God sent a new order—the prophets—to witness for him in plainer warnings. They were bold reformers, and reprovers of idolatry, iniquity, and hypocrisy; they called attention of the people to the moral law, the standard of true holiness; they showed the inefficacy of ceremonial observances, without the obedience of faith and love; and they kept up and encouraged the expectation of the promised Messiah, and more fully declared the sufferings of Christ and the glory that should follow.

The claims to be considered as God's appointed servants were demonstrated by the unimpeachable integrity of their characters, by the intrinsic excellence and tendency of their instructions, and by the disinterested zeal and undaunted fortitude with which they persevered in their great design. They were still further confirmed proof which they gave of their divined support, and by the immediate completion of many smaller predictions which they uttered. Their grandest object was to declare the spirituality of God's religion, the necessity of repentance, and the fullness and freeness of the divine salvation, which was to be wrought out by the coming Messiah: we see the proof of their remark especially in Isaiah and in the last and greatest of prophets before Christ, John the Baptist.

The ancient Jews always acknowledged that the chief design of the prophets was to foretell the times of the Messiah. The dress of the prophets was a hairy garment with a leathern girdle (Isa. 20:2; Zech. 13:4; Matt. 3:4); and their diet was the simplest (2 Kings 4:10, 38; I Kings 19:6), a virtual protest against abounding luxury. The absence of any greater clearness in their predictions is due to God's purpose to give light enough to guide the spiritual, and to leave darkness enough to confound the carnal mind. Many of the prophecies have a temporary and local, fulfillment foreshadowing their final Messianic fulfillment. The prophets were the poets and historians of their people. (Hassell's History)
