FROM THE PASTORS DESK

Jesus is our true friend that sticketh closer than a brother. He has promised never to leave or forsake us because He that performed a good work in us will perform it unto the day of Jesus Christ. (Phil. 1:6) However, Jesus will not stand by us when we are in the wrong, having transgressed His laws. The apostle was beaten, put into prison, and accused by the Jews of preaching things contrary to the law of Moses. Paul was a Roman citizen and appealed to Caesar. Paul writes Timothy and says, "At my first answer no man stood with me, but all men forsook me: I pray God that it may not be laid to their charge." (II Tim. 4:16)

Paul had many friends in Rome but evidently they felt the need to remain silent and not assist Paul in his trouble. They all forsook Paul, but the Lord stood with him because he was in the right and give him strength to preach the unsearchable riches of Christ despite the opposition he faced. When the Lord stood with Paul, The Lord came to him and strengthened him to continue to declare the truth. There wasn't any wicked intent to those who failed to stand with him; many were his friends but weren't willing to stand with him. Contrast this with what Paul said concerning Alexander coppersmith: "Alexander the coppersmith did me much evil: the Lord reward him according to his works: Of whom be thou ware also; for he hath greatly withstood our words." (II Tim. 4:14-15) Those that forsook Paul had not done wickedly evil as did the coppersmith.

Many years ago, the country music singer, Tammy Wynette popularized a song entitled "Stand By Your Man" and forgive him for love's sake. We have a man who stands with us when we are in the right, but He is no ordinary man. He is the Godman, Christ Jesus who did nothing to be forgiven of because He was sinless; He is the One that forgives us our sins and comes to our assistance when needed. The question is "Will we stand with the Lord despite the opposition and faithfully declare His word and be a good disciple of Jesus Christ who loved us and gave His life for us?"

Paul stood with the Lord when formerly he was in opposition to Him because he wasn't born again. Now, he has been turned from a persecutor to a preacher of righteousness and declares that no man is justified in the sight of God by the deeds of the law. (Rom. 3:20) The Jews did not want to hear this and beat Paul unmercifully; thus Paul is before the Roman emperor.

Paul was not alone when he gave his first answer; the Lord was standing with him. When Jesus was led away to be crucified, all the disciples forsook Him and fled. Jesus told His disciples, "Behold, the time is coming, yes, and has now come, that you will be scattered, everyone to his own place, and you will leave me alone. Yet I am not alone, because the Father is with me." (John 16:32) The Father was with His Son; He always (without exception) did that which was pleasing to His Father. We cannot say the same.

The only time that the Father left Jesus Christ was for a moment in His ninth hour on the cross. "About the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, saying, "Eli, Eli, la-ma sa-bach-tha-ni? that is, My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Matt. 27:46) Jesus was forsaken that His people would not be forsaken so He could promise "I will never leave thee or forsake thee." What a Savior we have who stands by us in the good times and the bad and often whispers sweet peace in our ears. When Israel was ready to stone Moses, the Lord was with him and he interceded on their behalf.

Even though Paul's friends in Rome did not stand by him in his distress, other children of God did stand by him when he was in bonds at various time, enduring much loss to help him. We read in Heb. 10:34: "For ye had compassion of me in my bonds, and took joyfully the spoiling of your goods, knowing in yourselves that ye have in heaven a better and an enduring substance." Anything in this life will ultimately perish but not in heaven as eternity lasts or endures for ever and ever. When Job's friends failed as miserable comforters, he was able to endure and say, "Though he slay me, yet will I trust in him: but I will maintain mine own ways before him." (Job 13:15)

Lest we get the idea that the Lord always is with us and stands by us whatever we do, we read that is not the case in scripture. King Asa was one of the good kings of Judah and he defeated the enemies of Israel on many occasions because he relied upon the Lord. Then he was warned by the prophet Azariah, "...The LORD is with you, while ye be with him; and if ye seek him, he will be found of you; but if ye forsake him, he will forsake you." (II Chron. 15:2) Asa failed to take heed and made an alliance with the ungodly and was defeated by the host of Syria's king because he had not relied on the Lord. The Lord had forsaken him (not eternally) because he had not done right as in former times. The Lord stood with Paul because he was in the right and He will with us in like manner. (Larry Wise)

*********** SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

"Having eyes, see ye not?" Mark 8:18

Have you ever noticed how some people will not believe what you may tell them no matter the amount of proof you have? They just do not want to believe God's children are saved by grace and not by their own works.

In Mark 8:7-8 you will find a rendering of where Jesus fed the multitude with seven loaves of bread and a few small fishes and had seven baskets of leftovers. After entering a ship with his disciples, they came to Dalmanutha where they were met by a group of Pharisees who "began to question with him, seeking of him a sign from heaven, tempting him." The Pharisees prided themselves in knowing everything that went on. Surely they knew of the

miracles which Jesus had performed of healing the sick, raising the dead, casting out demons, walking on water, calming storms, and now feeding multitudes with a meager amount of food, multiplied by the power of God. In addition, Jesus had preached the gospel, and preached it clearly. And yet these Pharisees wanted a sign from heaven. Like the saying of old, they were 'as blind as a bat'.

If the Lord has not opened the heart of understanding of an individual, they are spoken of in the scriptures as being blind. Jesus told the disciples to "beware of the leaven of the Pharisees, and of the leaven of Herod" (Mark 8:15). Even the disciples, who were already regenerated and were now in a state of conversion, were blind to the truths of enlightenment which Jesus was teaching. They saw His miracles and heard His words, but even though they had been born again, they weren't using their spiritual remembrance prompting Jesus to say, "Having eyes, see ye not? and having ears, hear ve not? and do ve not remember?" (Mark 8:18). They remembered there were twelve baskets left when he fed the five thousand plus, and also remembered the seven baskets of leftovers after the feeding of the four thousand. Jesus went on to say, "How is it that ye do not understand?" (Mark 8:21).

There are three times in the life of a child of God when they are, or can be, in a blind condition. 1. Prior to regeneration (being born again) 2. Prior to conversion (changing of our walk) 3. During periods of Self Righteousness, Pride or Ignorance (willful neglect of being a good disciple of Christ - Judicial Blindness). Those who do not belong to God (the non-elect) remain in a state of blindness and will never understand the things of God because their hearts are hardened, having only a carnal nature. God's children take on a spiritual nature when they are born again of the Spirit and then are in a condition of being able to see the truths of God. When they are converted, they can see to walk in the narrow way, changing from following worldly pleasures to walking (seeking) to praise, honor and glorify God.

Now, the third time a child of God can be in blindness is when we willfully turn away from God (backslide) and lose our close spiritual relationship with the Saviour. This sorrowful condition we can find ourselves in can be caused by a feeling of our own self righteousness or our failing to draw nigh unto Him which brings about ignorance on our part. A failure to study God's word is upmost in bringing about this condition.

We as God's children, should be so thankful unto the Lord for all of His blessings and benefits that we would never backslide (fall away) from the feeling of His spiritual blessings during our earthly existence. Look about you and count your blessings, which you must have your eyes open to see. Thank Him for opening your eyes to enable you to see Him for who He is... the Saviour of sinners. "Think About It!"

COMMENT ON JOB 2:3

What is meant in Job 2:3? I do not understand how Satan could move God to destroy Job without a cause.-J. D. BENCH, Greenville, Texas.

The above mentioned Scripture reads, "And the Lord said unto Satan, Hast thou considered my servant Job, that there is none like him in the earth, a perfect and upright man, one that feareth God and escheweth evil? and still he holdest fast his integrity, although thou movedst against me to destroy him without cause."

This does not conflict with the immutability and omniscience of God; neither does it support Fatalism nor Arminianism. It does not teach that Satan so worked upon the Lord in this matter that it caused Him to change His mind and purpose toward Job or influenced Him to turn against him, because the Bible plainly teaches that God is unchangeable-that He is of one mind and none can turn Him-the same yesterday, today and forever; but the idea is, Satan proposed this matter to the Lord, requested it and was anxious to have it done-that is, have Job destroyed and also to take his life, and, in a measure, the Lord allowed him to succeed; but God did not change in any sense. It worked out just like God knew it would work out.

The Lord was not disappointed in it at all. But what is meant by the words "movedst against me to destroy him without cause" is, Satan was urging the matter without cause; he could give no intelligent reason for his arguments. It was not the destruction of Job that was without cause; it was not what God did that was without cause: but it was Satan's motion and propositions that were without cause. In other words, there was no occasion for what Satan said to the Lord about Job. However, in a limited sense, the Lord granted Satan's request and turned Job over to him. Not that the Lord ceased to care for him, love him and own him as His child, for nothing can separate one from the love of God {Ro 8:38-39} nor destroy the life implanted in the soul in the work of regeneration. See Col 3:3- 4: Joh 10:28. Job's life was still in the hand of God and Satan could not touch it, not only his spiritual life but his natural life. He was destroyed, in the sense that everything else was taken away from him, but he lived on for years after this and still held on to his integrity; and while he afterwards mourned and even abhorred the day of his birth, because of the weakness of the flesh, yet after all of his afflictions and trials and, finally, when she, who had been his bosom companion and sharer in the jovs and sorrows of life, told him to "curse God and die," yet he trusted in God, saying, "Though He slay me, yet will I trust Him." God did not allow Job to be so severely tried and sorely afflicted just to please Satan, but it was according to His own will and purpose and for the good of Job; yet it refuted all the arguments of Satan and redounded to the glory of God.

Hope is the Christian's anchor. He is saved by hope, (Rom. 8:24) but not in the sense that he is saved by the blood of Christ. The distinction is very broad and easily seen. "It rests in nothing less that Jesus' blood and righteousness." Men must and will ever fail to provide such refuge for the faint and weary ones. God has set before you a hope which is sure and steadfast and it enters into that within the vail, and that is to Jesus your Saviour.

This hope of homeward bound saints has stood amid the storm of centuries an unfailing support, an impregnable fortress, the imperishable rock of safety. FOOLISHNESS TO THEM THAT PERISH

I asked someone recently to summarize for me what he understood the gospel to teach. He thought about it for a long time and he finally said, "Christ came into this world to suffer and die in order that people could be saved. And anybody can be saved, if they will only repent and believe the gospel, and live according to its precepts." I wrote his statement out on a scrap of paper, and asked him if he thought that was an accurate statement of what it took for a person to live in heaven some day. He said he did.

I asked him if he should take that little paper and show it to his pastor, what would he think about it? Would he think it was reasonable or foolish? He allowed his pastor would think it was reasonable. I asked him if he showed his statement to a thousand ministers of various denominations (and I listed a string of them for him) what would they think about it. He said that some of them might want to add "enduring to the end" or water baptism, etc. to the formula, but that in general they would all agree with the statement.

I asked him if he took that paper to one hundred of the meanest men in town, what would they think of it? What would the gambler, the bootlegger, the drunkard, and the thief think about it? He allowed that the meanest man in town would have to agree with that statement. He said, "The meanest man in town does not want to be saved, but he would agree that when he gets ready to be saved, that's what it will take." He could not think of anybody who would challenge the statement.

I said, "Do you realize that you have just proved that that statement is not the gospel?"

"What do you mean?"

"That statement could not be the gospel. TOO MANY PEOPLE BELIEVE IT." If that statement was the gospel, this old wicked world would reject it. You will never find such a ready market as that for the gospel. This old world has no use for the gospel. Let me read something to you. "For the preaching of the cross if to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which are saved it is the power of God." 1 Cor. 1:18. When preachers and gamblers, deacons and thieves agree about what then gospel is, you can count on it, "the blind are leading the bind."

Then I turned the paper over and wrote this statement. "Before a person is born again, he is n such dreadful condition, that he cannot repent of sin, he cannot have faith, he cannot please God, he cannot even want to please God. If God waits for the sinner to repent of sin and have faith in him before he saves him, there will never be the first sinner saved." I showed hm the statement and asked him what he thought of it. Was it reasonable or foolish? He said it was foolish. I asked him what his pastor would think of it. What would a thousand preachers, chosen at random think of it? What would the meanest man in town think of it? He was sure that just about anybody he asked would think the statement was foolish.

Paul was right. I never doubted it for a minute. "The preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness." The contrary system could not be the truth. Too many people believe it. The contrary system is too much at peace with the world.—Harold Hunt

A Righteousness In Which Jehovah Himself Cannot Find A Flaw

We must have a righteousness in which Jehovah Himself cannot find a flaw, a righteousness which Jehovah cannot mend, a righteousness which neither sin nor Satan can mar; and unless we have on a righteousness of this nature, we can never enter into the blessedness of the world to come.

Where, then, are we to find it? Eternal praises to the matchless mercy of a covenant God, we have it in the blessed Person, glorious work, and spotless obedience of the Lord Jesus Christ! And, therefore, as it was essential for Him to fulfill all righteousness for His people, He loved the Lord His God with all His heart, with all His mind, and with all His strength. He began at the beginning, and went through holily, righteously, and steadily every step of the law of God and all in justice and righteousness. He fulfilled every iota of it, and gave it immortal glory and honor. The law could only require the perfect obedience of a perfect man, but He gave it the perfect obedience of the God-Man, and stamped forever a holy dignity and majesty on it, in order to manifest that this glorious righteousness is suited to every sinner's case, to all their needs, and to honor and glorify all the perfections of God; and thus He has "forever perfected them that were sanctified," all those who were set apart for Himself. They are perfected forever in His own blessed obedience and spotless righteousness; and this righteousness which God gives shall endure forever. As for you who have a righteousness of your own, you never can feel your need of Christ's righteousness. You do not know your need of it, and it is an insult to your pride to mention it. But, for the poor creature who feels himself to be a loathsome, vile, and ruined sinner, and is brought experimentally to feel what he is before a heart-searching God, and that every iota of the law is against him - for God to give this righteousness to him, to put it upon him and communicate the power of it to his soul, why it will raise and exalt him to such a blessed enjoyment of God's righteousness that his tongue will sing aloud and speak forth praise to the honor and glory of His blessed Name; and he will say, "My soul shall be joyful in my God; I will glory in the God of my salvation; for He hath covered me with the robe of righteousness; He hath adorned me with the garments of salvation."

"For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him." (II Cor. 5:21) (God's righteousness vs that of man) "But we are all as an unclean thing, and all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags; and we all do fade are as a leaf; and our iniquities, like the wind, have taken us away." (Isa. 64:6)

BOTH SOUL AND BODY

If the reader will have before him a "Cruden's Complete Concordance" find the word soul. In numerous instances it will appear in which the word soul means person, so soul is used interchangeably with spirit. Besides these uses of the word there are many texts in which the word soul is treated as the distinct entity from the body. Now, can we establish that the Scriptures authorize us to believe that man is a compound being having a human body and also a human soul? Open your Bible to Gen. 35:18. Here you have an account of Rachel's death at Ephrath in giving birth to a boy whom she called Benoni, but his father Jacob called him Benjamin. Here the Holy Ghost directing the pen of Moses says: "And it came to pass as her soul was in departing (for she died) that she called his name Benoni."

Now turn to First Kings 17:20. The child was dead; Elijah took him up into a loft where he abode, laid him on his own bed, stretched himself upon the child three times and cried unto the Lord and said, "Oh, Lord, my God, I pray thee, *let this child's soul come unto him again*. And the Lord heard the voice of Elijah, *and the soul of the child came into him again, and he revived."*

Again, Jesus said, "Fear not them which kill the body, but are not able to kill the soul: but rather fear him which is able to destroy both soul and body in hell" (Matt. 10:28). Unless we recognize the soul as an *entity* to be considered distinct from the body, how, without vague speculation, are we to understand what the Lord said to the thief on the cross? "Today thou shalt be with me in paradise." Their *bodies* were both on the earth. How are the spirits or souls of "just men made perfect" now with the Lord?

How do we understand Paul's uncertainty as to whether he was in the body or out of the body on one occasion (II Cor. 12:2-4). How will we understand and explain Paul's saying that "to be present in the body is to be absent from the Lord." And to be absent from the body is to be present with the Lord?" (II Cor. 5:6-8). Why multiply arguments? Certainly every reasonable man or reader is more ready to admit that the Scriptures teach that the soul is an entity.—Elder Charles Waters. *Zion's Advocate*, 1917

SALVATION IN REMEMBRANCE

"And thou shalt remember all the way which the LORD thy God led thee these forty years in the wilderness, to humble thee, and to prove thee, to know what was in thine heart, whether thou wouldest keep his commandments, or no."-Deut. 8:2

I tried to preach from the above text today at Valley Springs and as it is often the case with me after I review my feeble discourse, I see many things I left out, and so it was in this case. I do not know that I can better the case to pen a few thoughts on the subject, but maybe I can relieve my mind. If God's people were not forgetful, the above admonition would be useless. There is salvation in remembrance. Paul told the Corinthian brethren: "By which also ye are saved if ye keep in memory what I have preached unto you." Again: "Be not forgetful hearers." These texts show beyond a doubt that God's people do forget.

There is much to remember, which makes it the more important that we be much concerned over this important duty. It is true, God's poor saints have much to cause them anxiety in a temporal way in this life, but this should not be all their study.

"Martha was cumbered about much serving" while Mary had time to commune with Jesus, and I am sure many of us often neglect that better part.

"Remember all the way." How many things occurred by the way! One remarkable occurrence was the deliverance of Israel from Egyptian bondage. They were never to forget this even so are we not to forget our deliverance from sin and death. We should remember how our bitter cups have been sweetened, as the bitter waters were sweetened for Israel along the way. We should remember how our spiritual thirst has been quenched when we were perishing for water in this terrible wilderness, as the streams flowed out of the flinty rock for Israel, and that rock was Christ, and in all their wanderings the rock followed them.

Has it been the case with you that Christ has supplied you in all the straits you have been in? If so, then remember His loving kindness. Has the sweet gospel bread fed your hungry soul, as God rained down manna from heaven to feed the hungry Israelites? Then do not forget this great miracle. Has God appeared to lead you along life's rugged pathway and met and vanquished your enemies, as He did for Israel? If so, treasure it up in your mind. Again, your adversary has attacked from the rear, as he did Israel, has it seemed to you that God has in such instances stood in the rear between you and your enemies? If so, do not ever forget this. Have you forgotten the wells of salvation which refreshed you in the terrible wilderness, and the palm trees which shaded you from the burning heat of trials and reverses, as Israel came to the 12 wells and the 70 palm trees? If so, remember this until your dying day.

But again, have you forgotten the mistakes you have made along the way? Have you murmured and complained? Have you lusted after the fleshpots of Egypt? Have you "Loathed" God's bread from heaven? Have you had a mind to cast stones at your leaders? Have you gone into idolatry, as Israel did? All these things occurred to Israel in their wilderness journey, and they had to suffer for their wrongs.

Do not forget the chastening of the Lord. He will whip you every time you do wrong. Has it ever occurred to you that you are on trial to test you out, as Israel was? Not that God wanted to find out what was in you, but that you might discover your own weakness and thereby be humbled. Is it not a fact when all your weakness appears to your view, you realize that God must help or else you are ruined? If not supported by the God of our salvation, there's no telling what we might do or where we might drift.

WHO IS OUR KEEPER?

The first murder that took place in the history of man was when Cain killed his brother Abel. The Lord came to Cain and asked him where was his brother? Cain, replied, "I know not: Am I my brother's keeper?" (Gen. 4:9) Cain lied to the Lord because he said he didn't know where Abel was as the Bible says he was of that wicked one. (I John 3:12) However, he told the truth about being his brother's keeper. He was not his brother's keeper, but the Lord of glory was because Abel was righteous and Cain was not. Abel's faith sacrifice bore witness to his righteous state before the Lord. (Heb. 11:4)

No child of God is righteous except through the righteousness of Jesus Christ which is imputed to his children in the new birth as the merits of Christ's shed blood is applied to them. Paul writes, "Even as David also describeth the blessedness of the man, unto whom God imputeth righteousness without works, Saying, Blessed are they whose iniquities are forgiven, and whose sins are covered." (Rom. 4:6-7) The word "impute" means to take an inventory or lay to. Imagine what would happen if the Lord took an inventory of our sin; that account would condemn us to hell and the lake of fire. However, that inventory of sin was laid to the account of Jesus Christ and He paid the account in full as He said, "It is finished."

The Lord will "keep" His sheep because they are the apple of His eye. Satan will not steal a single person for whom Christ died. We can say along with David concerning Israel, "Behold, he that keepeth Israel shall neither slumber nor sleep. The Lord is thy keeper: the Lord is thy shade upon thy right hand." (Psalm 121:4-5) Israel depicts the Lord's chosen sheep which Jesus affirms that those sheep shall never perish as they have heard the voice of the Son of God." (John 10:27) The apostle Peter writes to the elect strangers and says they have an inheritance that is incorruptible, that fadeth not away, and is reserved in heaven for them. Regarding these same people, Peter declares, "Who are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation ready to be revealed in the last time." (I Peter 1:5) David says that the Lord neither slumbers nor sleeps so He is always on guard to keep His sheep. Just imagine what would happen if the Lord took a day off or even a second to sleep? It won't happen!

We cannot depend upon self to keep us from falling out of the everlasting love of the Lord. We do fall from the manifest love and favor of God in this world but not from His everlasting love and favor or else it would not be everlasting. We cannot be kept today and lost on the morrow because we have transgressed. There isn't any security in that. I remember Elder J. Q. Depoyster preaching many years ago that if he believed that he could be a child of God today but not tomorrow, depending on what he had done that day, he would be praying for the Lord to allow him to die on one of his good days. The Lord is our keeper and Jude says He is able: "Now unto him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of his glory with exceeding joy," (Jude: 24)

The fact that The Lord is our eternal keeper doesn't free us from any responsibility to keep ourselves as much as is humanly possible in the strait and narrow path that leads to life. How do we do this? Paul said, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me." (Phil. 4:13) Paul realized that he was a sinner and he needed to keep sin in subjection lest he lose his fellowship with the Lord and with the brethren in Christ Jesus. "But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway." (I Cor. 9:27) Paul could possibly be a castaway (unapproved, rejected) from the manifest love and fellowship of the Lord and the church.

Jesus charges those that love Him to keep His commandments which is part and parcel to keeping our body in subjection. Sin in the body is like a fire: just when we think we have it extinguished, it flares up and begins to burn again. In order that we be kept in the fellowship of the Lord, we must walk in the light as Jesus is in the light. John says, "But if we walk in the light, as he is in the light, we have fellowship one with another, and the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin." (I John 1:7) This is a daily walk with God in doing those things that are pleasing unto the Lord. This is by faith as we have the testimony of Enoch that before he was translated, he walked with God by faith. (Heb. 11:5) He could not have pleased God but by faith, and he would not have faith except the righteousness of Christ had been imputed to him in the new birth.

It is one thing to be kept by the power of God and be presented faultless in heaven and immortal glory. It is quite another to keep ourselves (by His enabling grace) from the evils of this world. This is our blessing and responsibility. Jude writes, "Keep yourselves in the love of God, looking for the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ unto eternal life." (Jude:21) Solomon said there wasn't a just man on earth that did good and sinned not. John affirms the same. (Eccl. 7:20; I John 1:8) One sin would be enough to keep us out of heaven, but Jesus paid for all our sins and keep us in His eternal love. In contrast, one unconfessed sin can destroy our fellowship with the Lord in this life.

HOLDING FAST

"Holding fast the faithful word as he hath been taught, that he may be able by sound doctrine both to exhort and to convince the gainsayers." (Titus 1:9)

How admirably and scripturally qualified to wield influence for good is the preacher who has ever, without wavering, held fast "the faithful word." No greater eulogy could be given him than the simple words "He kept the faith." Men who have set their faces against error like a flint and with humble boldness uncompromisingly contended for the truth have been the churches' greatest blessings and God's noblest servants.

Knowing the effects of an unstable ministry, the Apostle Paul, for the good of the church, gave special instructions concerning the kind of men he would have as teachers. "And the things that thou hast heard of me among many witnesses, the same commit thou to faithful men, who shall be able to teach others also." (2 Timothy 2:2) Great stress is laid upon FAITHFULNESS of teachers that they may be able, by precept and example, to teach others. A man's word can have but little weight if his actions do not conform to them. An old man used to say, "Do not as I do, but do like I tell you to do." His words were of little use. The preacher who by example proves unfaithful, cannot, successfully teach others.

The old adage, "Actions speak louder than words", will prove true and his words will fall as empty sounds. "Take heed therefore unto yourselves" that ye may "be able by sound doctrine" and worthy example "to convince the gainsayers." It would be hard to find a church well established in the truth where there has been an unstable ministry. Observations teach that churches blessed with a ministry of one heart and mind speaking the truth in love, have been free from hurtful controversy and division. It is a noticeable fact that most all church troubles are traceable to an unsound ministry. Seldom has there been trouble leading to a division but had its origin in some departing from distinguishing principles characteristic of the Church of Christ.

Men well established in the doctrine of grace will not make a brother "an offender for a word." But where there are real sentimental differences existing, and truth triumphs over error, it is not an infrequent occurrence for men whose designs have been thus frustrated to seek opportunity to oppose those who have "held fast the faithful word" and when some perplexing question arises, take advantage of the situation, confuse the minds of good brethren, apparently the result of a different opinion regarding "the perplexing question", when, in fact, the trouble is the result of the actions of unfaithful men in departing from the truth. It is well to know the REAL origin of the trouble before passing judgment on it; in fact, no just decision can be rendered without it.

Men who are satisfied with the goodness of God's house, who love the sacred principles and simple services therein, do not originate trouble. How necessary to heed the apostolic injunction, "Take heed unto thyself, and unto the doctrine, continue in them." "Hold fast the form of sound words, which thou hast heard of me, in faith and love which is in Christ Jesus." "Continue thou in the things which thou hast learned and been assured of, knowing of whom thou hast learned them." "...but speak thou the things which become sound doctrine." "In doctrine showing uncorruptness, gravity, sincerity, sound speech that cannot be condemned." Where these things are heeded by the watchman, the city rests in peace. But disregard for them will bring confusion and sorrow, and where "peace, like a river, attendeth thy way", cruel war rages to the unspeakable grief of many, and, often, in the death of churches once alive to the sweet gospel service, walking humbly together to the honor and glory of God.

The companionship of men whose fidelity and love for truth have ever been unquestioned and whose lives are being spent in efforts to propagate and defend it, is most sweet.

DO WITH CHARITY

Corinthians 16:14: "Let all your things be done with charity."

In our verse above the Apostle uses the word "charity". Charity comes from the Greek word "agape" which means love in action. Love is more clearly defined once it is put into action. Numerous times in the scriptures God speaks of his love for his children. He put his love into action when he sent his Son to redeem them. 1 John 4:10: "Herein is love, not that we loved God, but that he loved us, and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins." When Christ made himself lower than the angels, and took upon him flesh and blood, it was love in action. When he went to the cross and offered up his life for the children of God, it was love in action. He didn't just talk about his love for us, but he also put his love in action for us. He manifested his love for us through those actions.

With that in mind it shows us how to use charity in all that we do. Do it in love. Love that is put into actions through godly living. The word sacrifice also fits into the definition of love in action. In order for us to do that we will have to make sacrifices in our lives in order to show forth this sacrificial love. Remember what our Lord did on the cross, he was like a lamb that opened not his mouth, but as a faithful servant he left his enemies in the hand of God, and said not a word against, even prayed for God to forgive them Acts 8:32, Luke 23:34. If we follow his example and sacrifice our hurtful words, and leave it in his hands, we are putting our love to him in action. Another example for us is to put aside time to pray to our God daily. It will take sacrifices in order to do it. Ask God to help you to do this. Prayer is a wonderful thing that God allows us to have here on earth. The time is well spent in prayer to him. In doing so you will have put love into action. Love in action is such a important thing for us to show to God.
