FROM THE PASTORS DESK

We all, as children of God, have or will have saving grace for eternity; however, there is grace needed for everyday living and there is only one source of this need, and it is our Heavenly Father. Paul tells us in Romans 5:1 that being justified by faith we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Then he goes on to say in verse 2, "By whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand, and rejoice in hope of the glory of God." Paul tells the Roman church that they have access by faith into grace. Please note that they are standing in grace already (saved by grace) and are also standing for what grace represents which is salvation full and free.

Even though these Roman brethren are standing in the grace of God, they have access by faith into grace for their everyday needs and rejoice in the hope of the glory of God. There are some interstate roadways across the country that you cannot "access" from just anywhere. There must be a place or road of access to get on that major roadway. We have access by faith into grace for running our Christian race on God's highway that gives peace and joy. We cannot get admitted into a theater to watch a movie without an admission ticket. Faith is our admission (access) ticket that has been given us in the new birth.

We cannot access our Heavenly Father outside Jesus Christ. He is our mediator and intercessor. It is by Christ that we have this access through our faith utilized in petitioning God for grace in all our trials and efforts to serve Him. We are told in Hebrews 4:16, "Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." How do we come boldly, except through faith, believing He is able to provide? We are like Abraham who was strong in faith and was persuaded that what God had promised He was also able to perform. (Rom. 4:20-21) He eventually had that promised son but it came about on God's timetable and not that of Abraham. It is the same today as God doesn't change.

James tells us that He giveth "more grace". (James 4:6) God resists the proud but giveth grace unto the humble. We cannot have "more grace" unless we have had some grace already. We have access to the God of all grace, but we come boldly, yet humbly, to obtain mercy and find grace in time of need. God's grace is sufficient just as He told the apostle Paul when he asked the Lord to remove his thorn in the flesh.

I Corinthians 15:19

God did not see fit to remove Paul's thorn in the flesh, but He did give grace sufficient to bear it. He was using his faith to access more grace and he received it but in an unexpected way. This trial of his faith and that of ours is precious, even though we cannot understand it all. Peter writes, "That the trial of your faith, being much more precious than of gold that perisheth, though it be tried with fire, might be found unto praise and honour and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ:" (I Pet. 1:7)

God is faithful and He always has been. Because He is so faithful, He makes a way of escape (exit) to bear the trial. The same Paul that received grace sufficient also writes concerning this faithful God: "There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it." (I Cor. 10:13)

We have no idea what will transpire during the year, but we know One who does and who is able to give grace for today and hope for tomorrow. We often have not because we ask not so then ask because we have access to available grace. We may not know how to verbally express what we need, but God is able to intercede through our Mediator, Christ Jesus. "Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities: for we know not what we should pray for as we ought: but the Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered." (Rom. 8:26) This access to the grace of God is for God's people among both the Jews and Gentiles as Paul makes clear in Eph. 2:18: "For through him we both have access by one Spirit unto the Father." (Eph. 2:18)

There is saving grace for heaven and immortal glory that came through Jesus Christ who became poor that we might be rich. There is serving grace to live in a way that brings honor to the One who loved us and died for us. The Hebrew Christians were encouraged to continue faithful in serving Christ and not the law. This of course took grace so we read, "Wherefore we receiving a kingdom which cannot be moved, let us have grace, whereby we may serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear:" (Heb. 12:28)

I think that maybe we have been given grace to serve but we aren't using it as we should. Is that why our church houses are becoming sparser of those who have professed a faith in Jesus Christ? Thank God for access unto more grace to sustain! (Elder Larry Wise)

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*********** DISCIPLESHIP VS SONSHIP By Elder E. D. McCutcheon (Deceased)

It seems that many of our people have not been able to understand the difference in discipleship and sonship—for that matter it appears that not very many in the Christian religion realize the difference. It seems that a large portion of the energy expended in Christendom is given toward trying to make sons of dead, alien sinners. The Bible is abundantly clear; only one who has power to give life will be able to do that, and because "He does his will in the armies of heaven and among the inhabitants of the earth" and "whatsoever his soul desireth, even that he doeth" we must assume that every one of God's beloved will be made a son. Those who are dead are no more able to resist the call to spiritual life than Lazarus was to resist the call to natural life after being dead four days; there is absolutely no power to resist the call. "The hour is coming and now is when the dead SHALL hear the voice of the Son of God and they that hear SHALL live." (John 5:25)

Primitive Baptists know that sonship is certain for all of God's elect and that eternal glory is certain for all the sons. It seems that many of our people do not realize that discipleship is not certain—that discipleship is for only a few of the sons but that it is available to all the sons who hear and obey the gospel.

The gospel is NOT everything that is preached in the name of Christianity; the gospel is the complete story of man's creation, the fall, God's wondrous plan for the recovery of fallen man; the story of election, adoption, redemption, justification, effectual calling, sanctification, discipleship; death, resurrection and glorification. Discipleship and death are in the hands of men to a certain degree. There are some aspects of justification and sanctification which are left to men and prepares for death which came by man. It gives that blessed hope of life beyond the river of death.

True discipleship means that one is a follower of Jesus; it means that one has taken His yoke and is a learner. When one can truly commit his life to the Lord, can truly trust Him as his everything in the realm of religion and can believe His word, he can then truly find a life that is satisfying. The Holy Spirit often comes into the lives of God's children in the hour of surrender to His will and fills with joy unspeakable. This is the very beginning of discipleship. Perhaps this is why sonship and discipleship are often misunderstood by the believer: why so many believe that in order for one to go to heaven he has to be a disciple. When anyone begins to hunger and thirst for righteousness and cry for mercy, sonship has been established-all such have been born again. Then when relief comes-when an experience of grace has been felt, discipleship has had a small beginning.

After this beginning, transforming takes place in the lives of those who have become true learners, true disciples. They become more Christlike every day and are not conformed to this world but are transformed by the renewing of their minds. They receive the blessings of obedient sons and "grow up as calves of the stall". The kingdom is not meat and drink to them but is righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Ghost. These are the greatest blessings that God's sons have in this world.

To become a son, one must be born of God. The one born of God has no more part in the process than he had in his natural birth: only the recipient, fully passive.

To become a disciple, one must be born again, born spiritually. Then he must hear the gospel, believe the gospel, repent of his sins, confess his sins to God and confess Christ before men, to be baptized in water and become active in the church, then continue steadfastly in serving God's people.

Have you seriously considered being a dedicated disciple?

"First things First" ... 2-27-14

The words of the poet say, "He who could for sin atone, must have no blemish of his own". We agree with the writer of long ago. Although He had no sin He was made sin (not sinner) for us "that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him" (II Cor.5:21). He came as it was written of him in the volume of the book to do the Will of God. Thus in all that he did and all that he became the Will of God was manifest. By himself he has fulfilled the law, cancelled its demands, borne its penalty, suffered the vials of almighty wrath, poured out his soul unto death, descended into the grave and encountered and conquered the king of terrors on his own ground in his own house. To add to that, we could say that Christ has despoiled the enemy of his sting and robbed the grave of its victory.

The testimony recorded that, as the children were partakers of flesh and blood, Christ also took part of the same. That through death He might destroy him who had the power of death, that is the devil and deliver them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject unto bondage. He took not on himself the nature of angels but rather the seed of Abraham. "Wherefore in all things it behooved him to be made like unto his brethren; that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in things pertaining to God, to make reconciliation for the sins of the people" (Heb. 2:14-17).

The captivity and bondage of God's people was in the relation in which they stood with Adam. **"Therefore by the offense of one judgment came upon all men to condemnation"** (Rom.5:18). It took a sacrifice above that which the old covenant could provide in the sense that the law was weak through the flesh. It took more than a relationship to Abraham, a worldly sanctuary, the blood of animals and carnal ordinances to emancipate them from that government. The Son of God must be made flesh and dwell among them, he must be made like them in all points and yet be without sin; and although like them in the point of humanity, yet holy, harmless, undefiled and separate from sinners.

It is not hard to understand that His sheep (people) were held captive in the prison house of death and God's Justice kept the door. However, through the suffering and sacrifice of the Lord Jesus the full demands of the law were met and Justice could ask no more. Having done all and suffered all the law could demand and justice could inflict, he could enter into a greater and more perfect tabernacle not made with hands by his own blood. In doing so ONCE He obtained ETERNAL REDEMPTION FOR US. Those SHEEP Christ redeemed he does most assuredly CALL. We say that He knows his sheep and CALLS His sheep. He says, "I know My Sheep and are known of Mine". I add also; HE knows those who are NOT OF HIS SHEEP. Romans 8:29 says, "Moreover, whom he did predestinate them he also CALLED, and whom he called them he also justified; and whom he justified them he also glorified." It is scriptural to say that this is a holy calling that is not based on the work or obedience of the object (man) but according to his (God's) own purpose and grace which was given them in Christ before the world began (II Tim.1:9). It is an effectual call; that means the call is valid and has power to perform and produce its designed effect. If the call was NOT effectual it would NOT be a HOLY calling and would be defective. BUT A CALLING THAT IS HOLY CANNOT BE DEFECTIVE. It must secure the design of HIM who calls. His calls are NOT GENERAL calls to all mankind without exception, as the Missionary Baptists and the followers of Campbellism assert, but rather special and particular to the Sheep without a defective design (Jn.10:27-30).

The arminian will teach that God may call but the will of man may very well render the call INEFFECTIVE and the charge goes up from these same religious teachers, who know not what they affirm, that He may call some that are not his and endeavor to make them his but alas, He may often fail in the enterprise if men are NOT willing to obey. They say of the Primitive Baptists, "You hinder the preaching of the Gospel, make the church ineffective, destroy the zeal of the young and hinder the unsaved from coming to Christ who might otherwise be saved." I say that such a charge is false and the burden of proof is upon those who levy the charge to prove it.

I do say this and let it be understood in no uncertain terms. There is not a Primitive Baptist Preacher that I know or ever heard of that does not believe in preaching the gospel, but no matter how able the preacher, no matter how blessed the church or how zealous its members, it will NEVER add one soul to heaven's number. The will of man nor the preaching of the Gospel is not designed or relied on to perform such a task. The very thought of dividing the honors of salvation between the savior and the sinner is to say the least, foreign to the Word of God. NO MAN can add to his faith until he is in possession of faith; faith is a fruit of the Spirit and the gift of God and without it we cannot please God. No man can let his light shine who has no light to shine. The breaking of the pitchers of Gideon's 300 men could have produced NO LIGHT if the lamps had not first been in the pitchers. We say, as does the bible, that God has delivered us from the POWER of darkness and translated us into the kingdom of His dear Son; given us an inheritance among the saints in light; constituted us as children of the light; commanded us to walk in the light and let our light shine. The reason; "For God who commanded the light to shine out of darkness hath shined in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ" (II Cor. 4:6). AMEN.

Many "preachers" in the world today consider "a prosperous journey" as one returning from a journey having buckets of cash. I don't think that the Apostle Paul, writing Romans 1:9-12, had any such thing as monetary value in mind. He said, "For God is my witness, whom I serve with my spirit in the gospel of his Son, that without ceasing I make mention of you always in my prayers; Making request, if by any means now at length I might have a prosperous journey by the will of God to come unto you. For I long to see you, that I may impart unto you some spiritual gift, to the end ye may be established; That is, that I may be comforted together with you by the mutual faith both of you and me."

There are some things in life for the God called preacher, (and not daddy or mommy called) while attending a gospel meeting, whether he is called upon to preach or not, when leaving the place of worship, he carries home with him things not in his pockets but in his heart. Paul had this in mind when he said "For I long to see you..."

I have not traveled so far from home that I could not return within a few days. My son, served in Iraq, upon his return said that many of the soldiers on the plane when touching the ground in the good land of the USA actually kissed the ground when they stepped upon the soil of our nation once again. I think he was one of those that did the same. I know that many had a longing to see their loved ones once again. Some didn't make it back home. Many brought back memories that they wished they could have left in that foreign country and are still battling with things they saw and had to do. It has been this way down through the pages of time, in all wars. However, Paul had a great longing to see the brethren that he might impart unto THEM some spiritual gift to the end that they might be established, and I believe his desire was that they might be established in the faith. It is a wonderful blessing to return home from a wonderful, spiritual gospel meeting with the saints in which all were strengthened in the faith.

As preachers, we need to keep in mind that the greatest blessing one can have in gospel service is to have been with the brethren in a true worship service, serving the Lord with our spirits. A service free from bondages of formalities and were blessed to worship in truth and in spirit, singing, praying, and preaching. Paul wrote in verse 13 "Now I would not have you ignorant, brethren, that oftentimes I purposed to come unto you, (but was let hitherto,) that I might have some fruit among you also, even as among other Gentiles." Paul was not using the word "fruit" as being apples and oranges. His desire of having a prosperous journey was that the saints would be more established in the faith and that there be some new converts from the

heathen religions to the true gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ.

One of the saddest things for a gospel minister is to return to a certain location and discover there were those that started out in the faith, in the right order, and now had left for another gospel which is not another. The reason for this is they were never really established in the true gospel. Paul wrote to the Galatian churches the following: "I marvel that ye are so soon removed from him that called you into the grace of Christ unto another gospel: Which is not another; but there be some that trouble you, and would pervert the gospel of Christ." Notice some here were "so soon" removed from Christ which had called them into his grace. They were removed unto another gospel. I had rather baptize one that remains faithful to the church for the remaining of their days than 100 that leave the Church for another gospel. This is why I do not "count" numbers. Our hearts rejoice when one is brought to the understanding that truly salvation is of the Lord and not a mixture of grace and works for salvation.

It is by grace that we are saved from so great a death that came upon us by our father Adam, being washed from our sins in the blood of Jesus. Paul warns the churches at Galatia that there is not another gospel. Why do some allow those that pervert the gospel of Christ to trouble them to the point of departing from the faith, and gong after some strange gospel, which is not another? Paul further states in Gal. 1:8-9 "But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed. As we said before, so say I now again, If any man preach any other gospel unto you than that YE HAVE RECEIVED, let him be accursed." These folks had heard the true gospel, because Paul said he did not receive this gospel from men but from God. Not only had they heard it but also received it. The word "received" as found in this scripture means "to join to one's self as a companion." We ought to remain married to the gospel. When one leaves the gospel for that which is not another, (also included is the biblical way of worshipping, true gospel practice, and true doctrine), one is committing spiritual adultery. The Holy Spirit never bears witness to untruth. But one is carried away when seeking entertainment for the flesh and not the establishment in the faith. God help us to continue to seek that which is strengthening, for the upbuilding of the soul and spirit.

"He is the propitiation for our sins, and not for ours only, but for the sins of the whole world." 1 John 2.

The text certainly proves that sin is as universal as the "whole world," for it is the "sins of the whole world." If the "whole world" means all the race of Adam, it just as strongly proves the whole race to be sinners. The Campbellites and others who advocate infantile purity use this text to prove that Christ died for all the race. Very well, let us put them to the test, but substituting "all the human race" for the "whole world".

Syllogism

- **1.** Christ is the propitiation for the sins of all the race.
- 2. The infant is part of the race.
- **3.** Therefore the infant is a sinner.

But we try it by this theory:

- 1. Christ is the propitiation for the sins of all the race.
- **2.** But the infant is not a sinner.
- **3.** Therefor the infant is not part of the race.

How is that for theology?

Again. If Christ is the propitiation for all the sins of all the race, and propitiation means satisfaction, it follows that satisfaction was made for the sins of all the race. The entire race will therefore be saved unless they go to torment in spite of satisfaction made by Christ for their sins. Suppose we carefully study the text!

The educational question seems at present to be the prime factor of enthusiasm and necessity for some of our friends. Every paper teems with numerous and pressing pleas for more money for the education of more of our ministers for foreign work. Great heavens! What next? In these same papers comes the admission that men are ready to go, but no means with which to send them. Think of heathens going to hell for want of educated preachers. Some are ready to go, but can't without money, and what money can be gotten is used to educate more. Better send what you have on hand for the heathens are multiplying faster than our clergy. Besides, the souls that are going to hell now are as precious as any other could be in the future. If their creed be true, God's machinery is powerfully clogged. The thing is already running backward, because where they get one abroad, the Catholics likely get two here at home. "He that provideth not for his own, especially them of his own household, has denied the faith and is worse than an infidel."



THE BODY

The word can be used as singular or it can be used to denote a group or singular units as one. The body of man is only one component of man. The Apostle Paul names at least three components of a man in (I Thes. 5:23). "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." This is evidence to me that God saved the whole man, all three components. When I come in contact with you I recognize you by your body. It can be by sight or sound or other senses of the body. I don't have the ability to see your soul or your spirit. I can only see the evidence of them.

Brethren, I pray you will be charitable and allow me to discuss the body and its use here.

We all have a body. God gave us one and even the Lord Himself took upon Him a body. (Heb. 10:5) "Wherefore when he cometh into the world, he saith, Sacrifice and offering thou wouldest not, but a body hast thou prepared me:" His was prepared and ours was formed of the dust of the earth. The first man had a body.

This body, because of sin will die and return to the dust. (Job 19:26) "And though after my skin worms destroy this body, yet in my flesh shall I see God:" Job seems to be assured that he would see God in the flesh. Let us be ever so thankful for what Paul taught us in (Phil. 3:21) "Who shall change our vile body, that it may be fashioned like unto his glorious body, according to the working whereby he is able even to subdue all things unto himself." Our body will be fashioned like unto His glorious body. His body had no sin about it neither did it see corruption. (I John 3:2) "Beloved, now are we the sons of God, and it doth not yet appear what we shall be: but we know that, when he shall appear, we shall be like him; for we shall see him as he is." Won't it be wonderful to be like Jesus?

The Roman letter seems to confirm this. (8:23) "And not only they, but ourselves also, which have the firstfruits of the Spirit, even we ourselves groan within ourselves, waiting for the adoption, to wit, the redemption of our body." The whole man was embraced in the redemption.

To use this body to serve God requires some effort on our part. (I Cor. 9:27) The Apostle Paul had this to say, "But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway." Notice he says bring it unto subjection, indicating it is not always in subjection. I feel it is made subject to that spiritual man.

Even the body is made up of different components. In (Eph. 6) the Apostle Paul mentions several body parts in describing the armour of God. "Loins girt about with the truth—breastplate of righteousness—feet shod—and helmet of salvation." God used these body parts to illustrate His defense for us as we fight this warfare while on our journey. He gave us this armour that protects the entire body. He gave us only one offensive weapon, even the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

(Eph. 4:12) "For the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ:" The Church, being made up of many is referred to as the body of Christ. God gave us a work to do and a body to do it with. It is even the place where the Spirit of God dwells. (I Cor. 6:19) "What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own?" Brethren, Shouldn't this cause us to be more careful what we do with and to our bodies, realizing that the Holy Ghost is in you and ever present with you. It is a witness of all that the body does.

(Rom. 12:1) "I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service." I think this is what the Apostle Paul was referring to when he said I bring it unto subjection. God gave us a body and instructed us to present it a living sacrifice to Him, (not a dead sacrifice) and He says this is our reasonable service.

(I Cor. 6:20) "For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's." He just gave us our work to be done in our body and in our spirit. He also declares that they both belong to Him. Brethren, if this body belongs to God, and it does, maybe we ought to exercise more caution in how we present it to Him. As we go through daily life we should remember that the Holy Ghost dwells in this temple.

Would God be pleased with the manner we present our bodies? Are you comfortable in His house and His presence? Remember, it belongs to Him and we are to use it to glorify God. Let us be careful what we expose it to and how we treat it, knowing it is the temple of the Holy Ghost.

I pray these few remarks might make us conscious of how we dress it and take care of it. Remember it belong to God.

PRESERVATION VS PERSEVERANCE

In Jude verse 1, we read, "Jude, the servant of Jesus Christ, and brother of James, to them that are sanctified by God the Father, and preserved in Jesus Christ, and called:"

This is only addressed to the ones that are sanctified, preserved and called, showing that all that are sanctified and preserved and all that are preserved are called. In order to be preserved, there had to be a setting apart of God's people by God the Father, choosing us and placing us in Jesus Christ before the world began.

Then if we are sanctified by the Father, preserved in Jesus Christ, and called out of nature's darkness by the Holy Spirit and granted eternal life—we will live forever and forever. The word "preservation" means the act of preserving—to keep in safety, secure from harm, from injury, from decay or destruction. In order to be preserved you have to have a preserver, that is someone that preserves, that saves, that defends, that keeps you from harm or destruction.

This one is the one that we have been placed in that is Jesus Christ the Savior of sinners. You see, preservation is the work of God the Father, God the Son, and the Holy Spirit. John says that there are three that beareth record in Heaven—the Father, the Word, and the Holy Ghost—and these three are one. Man is not active in this sanctification, man is not active in this preserving and man is not active in this calling. This is the work of God.

In Ephesians chapter 6 verses 16 through 19, we read, "Above all, taking the shield of faith, wherewith ye shall be able to quench all the fiery darts of the wicked. And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God: Praying always with all prayer and supplication in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints; And for me, that utterance may be given unto me, that I may open my mouth boldly, to make known the mystery of the gospel."

To my knowledge, this word "perseverance" as used in verse 18, is only used this one time in the New Testament and it carries the thought as being persistent, to be earnest toward, to be diligent, to adhere closely, to continue, as to be in constant readiness.

This is indeed a great way to live our lives as children of God, yet there are many times in our lives that we fall and will fall short of the admonition that Paul gives. Yet Paul says that we ought to be praying in the Spirit, and watching thereunto with all perseverance and supplication for all saints. He also tells us that through putting on the whole armor of God that we are able to stand.

Yet we find Paul telling us in II Timothy chapter 2 that there were some false preachers preaching that the

resurrection was past already and overthrew the faith of some. He then says that nevertheless the foundation of God standeth sure having this seal, the Lord knoweth them that are his. Then we find Peter speaking in II Peter chapter 1, that we are given some things that we can add to. And says that if these things be in you and abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren or unfruitful in the knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. But he that lacketh these things is blind, and cannot see afar off, and hath forgotten that he was once purged from his old sins. This lesson today is telling us that we may or may not persevere, that it is possible that we are sanctified, preserved and called from a dead state in sin into a life in Jesus Christ, and we can start out following the Lord Jesus Christ in a way that is pleasing unto the Lord.

Then through the troubles and cares of life, or through the lack of devotion to the Lord, that we can forget that we were once purged from our old sins. You see, this purging is a one-time purging. Paul says that He has perfected forever them that are sanctified.

It seems to me that everything that man is active in, he fails and falls short, he stands and he falls. Yet we find that what God does, it is done forever. He speaks and it comes to pass. He says come and we come, he says hear and we hear, he says understand and we understand. The only assurance we have is in Jesus Christ. Even our belief did not come out from our own works.

Jesus says that this is the work of God that you believe in him that thou hath sent. If you believe that Jesus came from God and that he is the only begotten Son of God, that he is the Son of the living God, and that he is God manifested in the flesh, it is because God has worked a work of grace upon the heart that enabled you to believe.

What a wonderful thing it is to believe that we are saved by the grace of God, that because God loved us with an everlasting love, he elected you and placed you in Jesus Christ, preserved you in him and called you and gave eternal life to you through the new birth and this life really is eternal.

This life has no end, you will not be in grace today and out of grace tomorrow, even if you fall and your belief fails you and you forget that you were once purged from your old sins. You are still his, paid for by the precious blood of Jesus Christ. –Amen

ADOPTION

An adoption is not free; there is some expense involved. This is where redemption comes in: Paul talked about that in the Galatian letter. "But when the fulness of the time was come, God sent forth his Son, made of a woman, made under the law, To redeem them that were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons." (Gal. 4:4,5). To redeem means to buy back, to pay the purchase price. Redemption was the purchase price of adoption. And that is what the Lord did on the cross. He paid the price of our redemption, the expense of our adoption.

"For ye are bought with a price; therefore glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God's" <u>1 Cor.</u> <u>6:20</u>. He bought us; he paid for us; he paid the redemption price, and he is going to have what he paid for. Sometimes you and I pay a price, and we do not get full value for our purchase price. But you can be sure that God is going to have what he paid for. God will have with him in glory every one he redeemed and paid for on the cross.

The purchase price which the Lord paid on the cross of Calvary was the most expensive transaction this old world has ever known. "Forasmuch as ye know that ye were not redeemed with corruptible things, as silver and gold, from your vain conversation received by tradition from your fathers; But with the precious blood of Christ, as of a lamb without blemish and without spot:" <u>1 Pet. 1:18,19</u>).

When God created this old world, it did not tax his energies in the least. I used to think God rested on the seventh day because he was tired. He did not rest on the Sabbath day, because he was tired; he rested, because he was through. He had created all the worlds he intended to create. God could have created ten million worlds like this and never taxed his energies in the least.

When God created this world, he only created so much gold and silver. There is no more gold and silver today than there was the day he created it. But God could have created ten million worlds like this, if he wanted to, and he could have made every mountain on every world of gold. And he could have given ten million solid gold mountains for my redemption and yours, and that would have been such a small price to pay, compared to the price he did pay for our redemption. That would have been a bargain basement price. That would have been pocket change, compared to the price he did pay. He gave the very best heaven had for our redemption. He gave his only Son.

Both Adopted and Born

When you and I adopt a child, we are somewhat limited in what we are able to do for that child. We give him our name. We give him a place in our home. We shower him with our love, and we do everything we conceivably can for him. But there are some things we cannot do. We cannot give him the color of our eyes. We cannot give him the color of our hair, the shape of our nose, the cut of our chin, the sound of our voice.

It is in the nature of children to look like and to sound like their natural parents. I have three daughters, and to some degree or another, they all sound like my wife on the telephone. Sometimes, when I call home, if I know the girls are all there, I have to ask who am I talking to.
